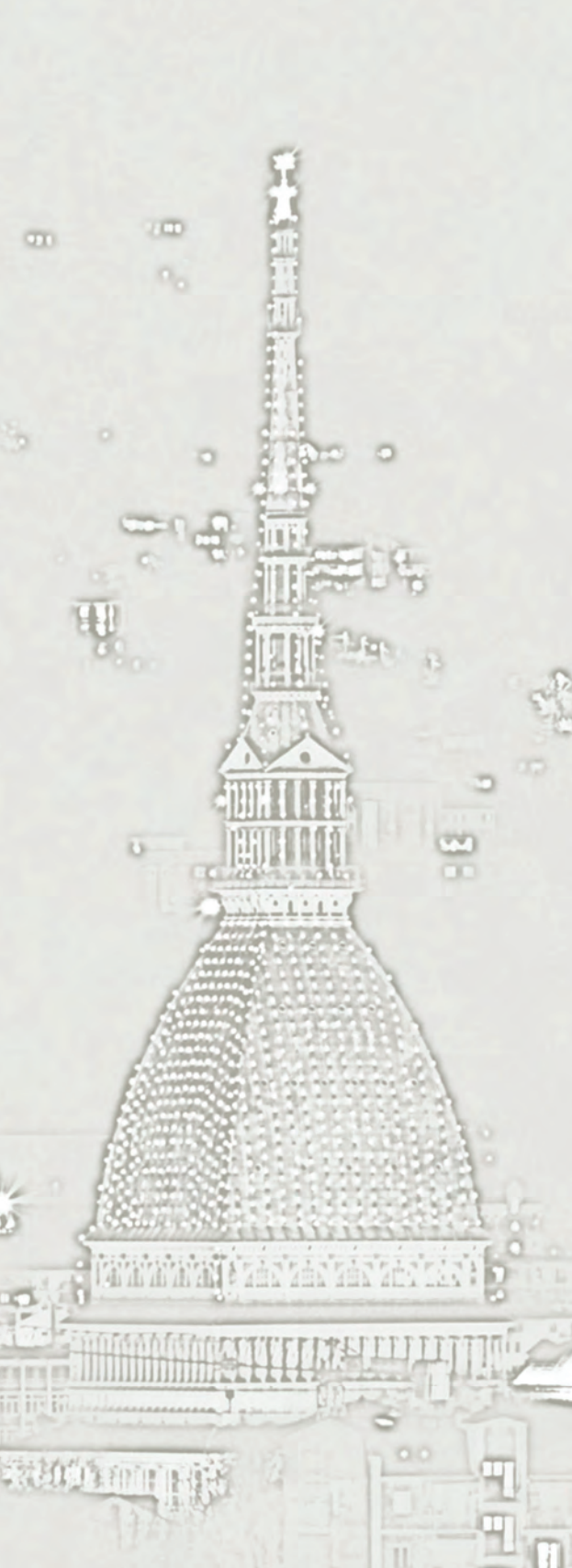

In 2019, the international vocation expressed by now for years by our city and which represents an identifying trait of its history was confirmed once more by a full calendar of events.

The extraordinary Leonardo da Vinci. Drawing the Future exhibition, the fourth edition of the Turin Islamic Economic Forum, the first edition of TO-ASEAN Business Days, the Korea Week, the VI Italian-Russian Seminar, the Vibrant Neighborhoods Forum, the European Masters Games, the week dedicated to Torino Design of the City due to its nomination as UNESCO Creative City for Design, are just a few of the prestigious international events that Torino hosted in 2019.

The growth of across-the-board initiatives in the city is the result of collaboration between a wide range of public and private institutions, associations, companies and businesses whose main aim is to attract investments to the metropolitan area that will favour the establishment of foreign companies and capitals, research centres and productive activities to develop the territory's economy, in a city like Torino which strongly believes in research and innovation and which today may be considered a point of excellence in productive sectors such as aerospace, automotive, biomedicine, telecommunications and food.

The Piedmont capital is further guaranteed this important international dimension by the high-quality educational offer of the University and Politecnico of Torino - attended each year by thousands of foreign students - as well as by the successful relation activities that the administration maintains through cooperation agreements

and twinnings with 38 cities all over the world, systematically signing bilateral agreements regarding economy, university, culture, tourism and cooperation.

Tourism, culture, sport and the environment are some of the strategic assets behind our territory's economy and will be the very focus of the administration's attention from the very first months of 2020, also in the light of forthcoming major international sporting events such as the ATP Tennis Finals 2021-2025.

Torino is already well at work to offer made-to-measure services for spectators and tourists and to carry out projects to promote the city's heritage allowing visitors to appreciate the charm of the town's museums, the beauty of its landscapes and delicious high-quality local cuisine.

# HIGHLIGHTS





## FOCUS Leonardo da Vinci. Drawing the Future

To celebrate the 500th anniversary of Leonardo da Vinci's death, the City of Torino proposed a full-packed programme of events organized in partnership with the Piedmont Region, the Royal Museums and Fondazione Torino Musei having as its linchpin the "Leonardo da Vinci. Drawing the Future" exhibition held at the Galleria Sabauda. The exhibit included over fifty works, dating from about 1480 to 1515, with a variety of subjects of different inspiration illustrating the artist's activity from his youth to full maturity. Among them the

thirteen autograph works including the Portrait of an Old Man and the Codex on the Flight of Birds. The different initiatives run from April to December and included concerts, conferences, conventions, exhibitions, meetings, installations, tours, workshops and shows highlighting the extraordinary talents of a man who devoted his whole life to art, innovation and science.



## FOCUS Korea Week

From 19 to 24 May residents and visitors had the opportunity to experience one of the most fascinating countries in the Far East: the Republic of Korea. The Korea Week, promoted by the Embassy of the Republic of Korea, the Korean Cultural Institute, the Consulate General of the Republic of Korea in Milan, the City of Torino and the Fondazione per la Cultura Torino, showcased a diverse range of art forms including cooking classes, K-pop, cinema, drama, music, traditional dances and taekwondo. The famous Buddhist monk/chef Jeong Kwan guided the participants through the Baru-gongyang experience, the formal monastic meal; the Piccolo Valdocco theatre hosted the K-Pop party featuring K-Pop cover dance groups

performing popular choreographies; the Cinema Massimo auditorium celebrated the 100th anniversary of Korean cinema screening two famous movies, Burning and Train to Busan; the central Piazza San Carlo was enlivened by an acrobatic taekwondo show while the Piccolo Valdocco theatre played host to The Original Drawing Show - a live drawing performance - and to the K-Traditional Performance - a traditional music and dance show. In the frame of the week, a special focus was placed on the economic and investment opportunities with a meeting on "Korea-Italy Strategic Partnership, Promoting the Inter-Korean Dialogue and Strengthening Economic Cooperation" held at Palazzo Madama.



### 13 – 16 January Vibrant Neighborhoods Forum

The Cities of Memphis, New Orleans and Detroit from the US and Brussels, Torino and Cologne from Europe gathered in Torino for the Vibrant Neighborhoods Forum organized by the German Marshall Fund. The forum explored the role of civic engagement in policy-making and planning processes as a tool to address social and economic disadvantage in neighborhoods segregated by race, ethnicity and income.

### 1 – 16 February Stalingrad, a call for peace

The Villa Amoretti civic library hosted the photographic and documentary exhibition held to remember the anniversary of the Soviet soldiers' victory against the Nazi forces in the Battle of Stalingrad during World War 2. The opening ceremony was attended by the Deputy Mayor for Culture of Volgograd, former Stalingrad, Andrei Lyakh.



### 11 February International cooperation and cultural heritage protection

The results of the cooperation project coordinated by the Jericho Mosaic Centre in partnership with the City of Torino and the Centro Conservazione e Restauro La Venaria Reale were presented during the conference themed “International cooperation and cultural heritage protection in Bethany” held at the Museum of Oriental Art. The CCR La Venaria Reale in collaboration with the University of Torino provided technical support to the Jericho Mosaic Centre for a restoration work in the archaeological site known as the Tomb of Lazarus. It also delivered a multidisciplinary training programme on conservation and restoration attended by twelve Palestinian students.

### 26 – 27 March European cities and strategic planning

The Main Hall of the Cavallerizza Reale hosted the conference on “European cities and strategic planning: 30 years later” organized by the University of Torino and the City of Torino, a debate between different European cities on urban development and strategic planning. The event was joined by the Cities of Glasgow and Barcelona and by the EUROCITIES network. The second day, focusing on the relation between universities and municipalities, was attended by representatives of the Universities of Newcastle, Barcelona, Bilbao, Glasgow, Lyon and Torino.

### 9 – 13 May International Book Fair

The 32nd edition of the International Book Fair offered visitors the narrative of the contemporary world through the words of writers, scientists, journalists and artists. Guest language of the event was Spanish, while Sharjah in the Arab Emirates, UNESCO World Book Capital 2019, was guest of honour of the event.



### 4 – 5 June Clean Air Dialogue

The Italian Ministry of Environment, upon suggestion of the EU Commissioner for Environment Karmenu Vella, convened in Torino a two-day event gathering decision-makers and stakeholders sharing their views to address the issue of air pollution. The “Clean Air Dialogue” is part of the “Clean Air Policy Package”, a bilateral dialogue between Italy and the EU Commission to share knowledge, best practices and feasible solutions on air quality improvement.

### 17 – 18 June TO-ASEAN Business Days

The Torino Chamber of Commerce and the University of Torino, together with T.wai and with the support of the City of Torino, organized the first edition of the partnering

international event gathering public and private actors with an interest in the 10 countries in Southeast Asia forming the ASEAN region. High-level speakers and experts from the business and diplomatic sector joined the event.



### 18 – 19 June Thematic seminar on interculturalism

The City of Torino hosted the seminar on “Fighting Discrimination and Hate Speech: is interculturalism the solution?” organized in partnership with the Intercultural Cities programme of the Council of Europe. The international event explored two main themes: the use of artificial intelligence to combat discrimination, hate speech and hate crime and how to encourage intercultural approaches within local governments.

### 2 – 20 October Torino Design of the City

In October Torino celebrated its huge range of design activities with a dedicated programme including a stimulating series of events, exhibitions, workshops and talks. The 2019 edition's theme - The City of the Future - was strictly related to the programme of the XIII UCCN Annual



Conference held in Fabriano, where Torino had the role of Italian City Coordinator of the Design Pavillion. The Torino Design of the City programme emphasized the international scope of design and, during the International Forum central event, the cities of Detroit, Saint Étienne, Cape Town, Kortrijk, Singapore and Shanghai presented to the audience their design projects. The forum was also attended by delegates from the cities of Madrid and Lille. Another significant moment of exchange was the debate between Bremen, Helsinki, Milan and Torino on the strategic development of their respective library services.

### 13 October Celebrations for the 70th anniversary of the People's Republic of China

To mark the 70th anniversary of founding of the People's Republic of China and the forthcoming celebrations of 50 years of diplomatic relations between Italy and China in 2020, the Chinese associations in Torino jointly organized in the central Piazza Castello a show featuring traditional dances and music as well as a photo exhibit. The exhibition, entitled "70 years of glory", witnessed through 70 pictures the changes China has undergone in the last 70 years and its friendship relations with Italy. The event was supported by the Chinese Consulate General in Milan under the patronage of the City of Torino.

### 25 - 26 October Climathon

Torino played host, for the fourth consecutive year, to the 24-hour hackathon on climate change, the international event that in the 2019 edition involved more than

100 cities in over 40 countries, from Paris to São Paulo, from Lagos to Kuala Lumpur and Sidney. The event, promoted by EIT Climate-KIC and organized by the City of Torino and Environment Park, gathered key players for a moment of exchange and debate on the challenge posed by the City of Torino: the development of innovative solutions supporting a more circular life-style.

### 28 - 30 October TIEF

Torino hosted the fourth edition of the Turin Islamic Economic Forum themed "Creating a holistic environment for the Islamic economy". The three-day event featured eight sessions with insights and debates on several issues such as new urban and social impact policies, artificial intelligence, fintech, blockchain and Islamic creative economy with a special scientific focus on Islamic finance. The forum was organized by the City of Torino in partnership with the University of Torino, the Torino Chamber of Commerce and ASSAIF, with the support of Turismo Torino e Provincia.



### 13 - 27 November Mongolia - Uvurkhangai, glimpses of beauty under the endless sky

A photo exhibit exploring Central Mongolia with its untouched beauty and fascinating culture was held at the Andrea Della Corte music public library on the occasion of the stay in Torino of a delegation from Kharkhorin led by the President of the Uvurkhangai Region Gochoo Ganbold and by Mayor Enkhbat Lamzav.



### 22 November VI Italian-Russian Seminar

Innovation as the engine of economic growth was the main topic discussed during the Italian-Russian seminar organized in Torino by the Conoscere Eurasia Association, Roscongress, the St. Petersburg International Economic Forum, the Torino Chamber of Commerce and the City of Torino. Aim of the meeting was to explore the opportunities of exchange and cooperation in several fields, in particular aerospace and automotive. The event saw the presence of the Ambassador of the Russian Federation to Italy, Sergey Razov.

### 28 November Italy-Israel Innovation Mixer

The Intesa Sanpaolo Innovation Center hosted the event promoting innovation and b2b sessions between Israeli start-ups and leading companies belonging to the Torino City Lab project and the Italian ecosystem. During the event the Israel Innovation Authority and the City of Torino signed an agreement boosting the promotion and development of innovative projects in the presence of the Italian Minister of Innovation Paola Pisano, of the CEO of the Israel Innovation Authority Ami Appelbaum and of the Mayor of the City of Torino Chiara Appendino.

### 30 November Konrad Mägi. The light of the North

Palazzo Chiabrese opened "Konrad Mägi. The light of the North", an exhibit dedicated to Konrad Mägi, one of the most outstanding Estonian artists renowned for his great expressive strength. The display consisted of nearly fifty works - mainly landscapes, portraits and sketches - revealing the painter's interpretations of nature and coming from collections of the Art Museum of Estonia, the Tartu Art Museum, from the private collections of Enn Kunila and Peeter Värnik and of the Estonian Students Society. On the occasion of the exhibition's opening, Torino welcomed the President of the Republic of Estonia Kersti Kaljulaid who visited the city and donated an oak tree which was planted in the Valentino Park during a public ceremony, in the presence of Mayor Appendino.



### 31 December New Year's Eve 2020 celebrations: the Magic of Cinema

After the 2019 Guinness World Records performance, Torino Masters of Magic entertained the audience with a great outdoor show celebrating 2020, the year dedicated to cinema on the 20th anniversary of the National Cinema Museum's opening at the Mole Antonelliana and of the Film Commission Torino Piemonte's founding. Cutting-edge international artists, fantasists, singers and magicians covered the most significant steps marking the history of cinema with a four-hour amazing show.

## BACAU – Romania

In 2007 the two Cities signed a Memorandum of Understanding in order to promote urban, social and cultural development and to support initiatives of integration addressed to the large Romanian community in Torino.

## BARCELONA – Spain

In 2005 a Memorandum of Understanding was signed to promote cooperation between the respective city markets, Porta Palazzo and La Boqueria. In 2017 the two Cities signed a Cooperation Pact to strengthen their economic, cultural and academic relations with a special focus on technological innovation through the exchange of know-how.

### Activities in 2019

- The City of Torino attended the EUROCITIES Knowledge Society Forum held in Barcelona.
- A delegate from the City of Barcelona gave a speech during the conference on “European cities and strategic planning: 30 years later”.
- Deputy Mayor for Innovation Paola Pisano attended the Mobile World Congress and the final conference of the URBinclusion project both held in Barcelona.
- Deputy Mayor for Innovation Marco Pironti took part in the Barcelona Smart City Expo World Congress.
- Delegates from the City of Torino attended in Barcelona the meeting on the #RavalKm0 project.
- Deputy Mayor for Youth, Integration and Equalities Marco Giusta received the award of the CLARINET project of the European Network of Cities Against Racism on behalf of the City of Torino.



## BETHLEHEM – The Palestinian Territories

In 2015 a Cooperation Pact was signed to support local development in the field of water management and commerce. The Pact followed a Letter of Intent expressing the will to reinforce cooperation between the two Cities.

### Activities in 2019

- Mission to Bethlehem as part of the NUR – New Urban Resources project.
- In the frame of the NUR project a delegation from Bethlehem visited Torino and three young artists exhibited their works at Paratissima, showcase of contemporary art.



## CAMPO GRANDE – Brazil

In 2003 a Cooperation Agreement was signed in the academic, cultural, social and economic fields.

## CANNES – France

Torino and Cannes, bound by historical cooperation relations, signed a Friendship Agreement in 2000 to promote common projects in the fields of culture, sport and youth.

### Activities in 2019

- Deputy Mayor for Commerce, Labour and Tourism Alberto Sacco attended in Cannes the MIPIM exhibition, the annual world's leading property market event.

## CHAMBÉRY – France

Torino and Chambéry are bound by a historical twinning signed in 1957. In 2015 the two Cities signed a Letter of Intent to further support the several activities, exchanges and projects carried out every year in different fields.

### Activities in 2019

- Study visit in Chambéry of a delegation from Torino in the frame of the YOUNG IN&UP project.
- Vice Mayor Guido Montanari met a delegation from the University Institute of Technology of Chambéry.
- The Deputy Mayor for International Relations of Chambéry attended the opening ceremony of the “Leonardo da Vinci. Drawing the Future” exhibition.
- Exchange of promotional tourism billboards between Chambéry and Torino.

## COLOGNE – Germany

Torino and Cologne are tied by a historical twinning agreement signed in 1958 to promote the path to European integration. In 2008, for the twinning's 50th anniversary, Cologne renewed its commitment to cooperate with Torino signing a Charter for Sustainability.

## Activities in 2019

- The Albertus Magnus Gymnasium of Cologne took part in Languages on Stage!, the European student festival of multilingual theatre, held at Casa del Teatro Ragazzi e Giovani.
- Internship of a student from Cologne in the Sport Department of the City of Torino.

## CÓRDOBA – Argentina

Córdoba has historical relations with Torino due to Piedmontese emigration. The Twinning Agreement dates back to 1986 and on its 30th anniversary the two Cities signed a Letter of Intent.

### Activities in 2019

- A delegation of engineering students came to Torino for study visits connected to the automotive sector.



## DETROIT – USA

The two Cities have been twinned since 1998. The agreement is aimed at strengthening relations by promoting cultural, social and economic exchanges.

### Activities in 2019

- The City of Detroit attended the “The City of the Future” international forum organized in the frame of Torino Design of the City.
- The City of Torino took part in the annual meeting of the UNESCO Creative Cities of Design held in Detroit.

## EKATERINBURG – The Russian Federation

The agreement was signed in 1998 in order to support and develop the cooperation between local management and economic institutions of both Cities.

## ESCH-SUR-ALZETTE – Luxembourg

Torino and Esch-sur-Alzette are tied by a historical twinning agreement signed in 1958 to promote the path to European integration. In 2008, for the twinning's 50th anniversary, Esch-sur-Alzette renewed its commitment to cooperate with Torino signing a Charter for Sustainability.

## FORTALEZA – Brazil

Cooperation Pact signed in 2016 aiming to encourage the exchange of good practices in the field of smart cities as part of the Torino Living Lab initiative.

## GAZA – The Palestinian Territories

The Twinning Agreement between Torino and Gaza was signed in 1999 at the end of a process started in 1993 to support the Middle East peace process by promoting a twinning with both an Israeli and a Palestinian city. Upon suggestion of the respective national authorities, Gaza and Haifa were chosen as twin cities.

## GLASGOW – The United Kingdom

Between Glasgow and Torino, twin cities since 2003, exchanges are based on urban renewal, art and culture.

### Activities in 2019

- The Lord Provost of the City of Glasgow gave a speech during the conference on “European cities and strategic planning: 30 years later”.
- The Scottish Ballet company performed during the Torinodanza Festival.



## HAIFA – Israel

Torino and Haifa signed a Memorandum of Understanding in 2005 at the end of a process started in 1993 to support the Middle East peace process by promoting a twinning with both an Israeli and a Palestinian city. Upon suggestion of the respective national authorities, Gaza and Haifa were chosen as twin cities.

### Activities in 2019

- Study visit in Torino of a delegation from the Haifa Tiltan College of Design.

## HARBIN – China

The relations with Torino arose in the industrial field but were also extended to the two municipalities, which signed a Letter of Intent in 2003.

## HO CHI MINH – Vietnam

Friendship and Cooperation Agreement signed in 2015 to foster exchanges in areas such as trade and commerce, education, science, technology, culture and environment.

## KHARKHORIN – Mongolia

Torino and Kharkhorin signed in 2016 a Cooperation Pact to promote mutual activities in the field of tourism and culture focusing in particular on historical, archaeological and inter-religious projects. On 13 November 2019, during a visit of a delegation led by Mayor Enkhbat Lamzav, the two cities signed in Torino a new Pact renewing their commitment.

### Activities in 2019

- A delegation from Kharkhorin led by Mayor Enkhbat Lamzav visited Torino for a series of institutional meetings, for the renewal of the Cooperation Pact and for the opening of the photo exhibit on “Mongolia – Uvurkhangai: glimpses of beauty under the endless sky”.



## KIRKUK – Iraq

Cooperation Pact signed in 2016 in order to promote mutual projects in the field of trade, culture and university.

## LIÈGE – Belgium

Torino and Liège are tied by a historical twinning agreement signed in 1958 to promote the path to European integration. In 2008, for the twinning's 50th anniversary, Liège renewed its commitment to

cooperate with Torino signing a Charter for Sustainability.

## LILLE – France

Torino and Lille are tied by a historical twinning agreement signed in 1958 to promote the path to European integration. In 2008, for the twinning's 50th anniversary, Lille renewed its commitment to cooperate with Torino signing a Charter for Sustainability

### Activities in 2019

- The Lycée Louis Pasteur of Lille took part in Languages on Stage!, the European student festival of multilingual theatre, held at Casa del Teatro Ragazzi e Giovani.
- Study visit in Lille of a delegation from Torino as partner of the MOLOC project.
- Students from Piazza dei Mestieri attended in Lille the Week of Italian Cuisine in the World.



## LYON – France

In 2012 Torino and Lyon renewed the Cooperation Agreement signed in 2007, supporting the rich history of academic, cultural and economic relations.

### Activities in 2019

- General assemblies of the MONICA and ROCK European projects in Lyon, also attended by the City of Torino.



- Partner meeting in Lyon of the CESBA MED project, attended by representatives of Torino.
- Delegates from Torino took part in the Lyon Light Festival Forum organized within the Fête des Lumières festival.
- Display in Lyon of the photo exhibit themed “A cœur partagé” on the life experiences of citizens living between Lyon and Torino.
- Exchange of promotional tourism billboards between Lyon and Torino.



### NAGOYA – Japan

Torino and Nagoya have been twinned since 2005. The agreement focuses on mutual promotion and exchanges in the fields of business, culture, environment and design.

#### Activities in 2019

- Exchange in the educational field between primary schools of Torino and Nagoya and between students of the Majorana and Kikuzato High Schools.
- Promotional activity in the Nagoya city centre of the Luci d'Artista event taking place in Torino.



### NANTES – France

In 2013 Nantes and Torino signed a Letter of Intent to promote mutual cooperation on cultural and environmental issues.

### NICE – France

The two Cities signed in 2018 a Cooperation Pact in the field of culture, university, business and innovation with a particular focus on urban security and smart city. The agreement confirmed the Letter of Intent signed in 2015.

#### Activities in 2019

- The City of Torino attended in Nice the kick-off meeting of the PACTESUR project and the European Week of Urban Security.



### PRAIA – Cape Verde

Torino and Praia signed in 2003 two cooperation agreements: a general Protocol and a specific Agreement for the Tira Chapeu district, further supplemented in 2005 by a trilateral cooperation agreement between Praia, Torino and ANCI – the National Association of Italian Municipalities.

### QUETZALTENANGO – Guatemala

The origin of this twinning, signed in 1997, goes back to 1992 when Torino awarded the honorary citizenship to the Nobel Peace Prize Rigoberta Menchú, to sustain the campaign against the discrimination of the Mayan people.

### ROSARIO – Argentina

In 2011 Torino and Rosario signed a Friendship Agreement, further strengthened in 2013 by a Letter of Intent aimed at supporting mutual cooperation on urban planning and development.

### ROTTERDAM – The Netherlands

Torino and Rotterdam are tied by a historical twinning agreement signed in 1958 to promote the path to European integration. In 2008, for the twinning's 50th anniversary, Rotterdam renewed its commitment to cooperate with Torino signing a Charter for Sustainability.

#### Activities in 2019

- The City of Torino took part in the transnational meeting of the Innovato-R EU project held in Rotterdam.
- Partner meeting of the HARMONY project in Rotterdam.
- Representatives from the City of Torino attended the “Cities under Microscope”

initiative held in Rotterdam and the Art & Culture Pillar meeting in the frame of the LUCI network.

- Representatives from the City of Rotterdam gave a speech during the Innovato-R workshop held in Torino.



### SAINT PETERSBURG – The Russian Federation

The City of Torino and the Government of Saint Petersburg signed in 2012 a multidisciplinary cooperation agreement covering different areas: science, culture, social and economic exchanges.

### SALT LAKE CITY – USA

The twinning with Salt Lake City was signed in 2006, aimed at exchanging experiences and encouraging meetings between the two communities.

### SALVADOR DE BAHIA – Brazil

The historical presence of Piedmontese non-profit organizations in Salvador de Bahia led the two Cities to sign, in 2003, a Cooperation Agreement following the twinning agreement already signed between the Piedmont Region and the State of Bahia.



## SHENYANG – China

The twinning between Torino and Shenyang dates back to 1985. Over the years, several institutional meetings have strengthened the bond between the two Cities.

## SHENZHEN – China

In 2007 the two Cities signed a Cooperation Agreement called The Two Bulls.

### Activities in 2019

- A delegation from the Shenzhen Napeng District visited Torino for a better understanding of the local budgeting system.
- Deputy Mayor for Culture Francesca Leon met the Vice Mayor of Shenzhen, Wu Yihuan, during her mission to China.

## SKOPJE – The Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia

In 2012 the two Cities signed a multidisciplinary Friendship and Cooperation Agreement.

## TIRANA – Albania

Cooperation Pact signed in 2016 in the areas of trade, culture and university confirming the Letter of Intent signed in 2009.

### Activities in 2019

- The City of Torino attended the workshop of the TRIVALENT project held in Tirana.

## YANGON – Myanmar

The Memorandum of Understanding signed in 2015 formalized the many ongoing activities of cooperation in the field of trade and services, tourism, social services, environment, local democracy, culture and art.

## ZLÍN – The Czech Republic

Agreement signed in 2004 to develop exchanges on cinema and audio-visual projects.

## Cooperation within the IUC CITY-TO-CITY programme

The City-to-City initiative of the EU International Urban Cooperation programme aims to pair up EU with non-EU partner cities, promoting their access to expertise in urban development policy and helping cities promote smart, green and inclusive growth. Torino has been paired with the Consorcio Intermunicipal Grande ABC for the Latin-American area for the exchange of experiences on urban mobility and transport, and with Baltimore in the US for an exchange on social innovation and urban regeneration.

### Activities in 2019

- Study visit in Baltimore focused on social innovation of a delegation from the City of Torino.
- The City of Baltimore attended the Open Innovation Summit on digital transformation held in Torino.

## Cooperation activities with other friend cities

### HAVANA – Cuba

The City of Torino, in partnership with AlceNero and Fondazione Lavazza, lent to the City of Havana “Planetarium” by Carmelo Giannello, one of artworks belonging to the Luci d’Artista light festival. The lighting installation was exhibited in the frame of the Avenida Italia cultural project to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the city’s founding.

### MARSEILLE - France

The cultural cooperation between Torino and Marseille led to the creation of TRASLOCO, a project featuring a programme of activities aiming to develop a cross-border co-production of exhibition projects and residences for independent artists living in Torino and Marseille. TRASLOCO was realized by Artesera in the frame of the NESXT festival.

The Deputy Mayor gave a presentation showcasing cutting-edge projects developed by the City of Torino, including Torino City Lab and Smart Road Torino.

### 12 – 14 March Cannes

The Deputy Mayor for Commerce, Labour and Tourism Alberto Sacco attended the MIPIM fair, the annual international exhibition dedicated to the real estate market. His participation was the occasion for a series of meetings with potential investors in the sector.

### 27 – 28 March Barcelona

Barcelona hosted the last transnational meeting of the Urbact URBinclusion network, attended by the Deputy Mayor for Innovation and Smart City Project of the City of Torino Paola Pisano. URBinclusion addresses the issue of poverty and inequality, promoting integrated strategies of social cohesion.

### 27 – 29 March Paris

Deputy Mayor for Commerce, Labour and Tourism Alberto Sacco took part in a promotional event organized at the new Eatly store in Paris where Torino and the Langhe and Roero area were promoted as a single destination.



### 1 – 4 April Sharjah

Alberto Sacco, Deputy Mayor for Commerce, Labour and Tourism, attended as representative of the City of Torino the 17th edition of the Sharjah Heritage Days, the big cultural event organized by the Sharjah Institute for Heritage on the occasion of the UNESCO World Heritage Day. The 2019 edition of the event was run under the theme “craft and calligraphy”.

### 10 – 11 April Paris

In the context of the activities organized all over the world for the Italian Design Day, the event promoting design as the expression of the Italian Brand promoted by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation, Deputy Mayor for Culture Francesca Leon attended the conference on “Design and the city of the future” held in Paris at the Italian Permanent Representation to the UNESCO.

### 10 – 11 April London

Deputy Mayor for Innovation and Smart City Project Paola Pisano attended the second edition of SMAU | Italy RestartsUp in London, the initiative aimed at creating a bridge among the Italian start-ups and incubators ecosystem, the London Hub and also the British market. She gave a speech in the section entitled “Smart Communities: the driver for development of territories and companies”.

### 19 – 22 May Shenzhen and Canton

The Deputy Mayor for Culture of the City of Torino Francesca Leon went on a mission to Shenzhen and Canton, together with representatives of the Politecnico of Torino and Film Commission. During their stay, besides several institutional meetings, the delegation members also visited the Pearl River Piano Factory in Canton. The area was object of a huge industrial regeneration project jointly developed by the Politecnico of Torino and by the South-China University of Technology to transform the former industrial complex into a new creative district dedicated to the theme of music.



### 23 May Berlin

The City of Torino, represented by Deputy Mayor for Innovation and Smart City Project Paola Pisano, has been the first public authority officially partnering with 5GAA, the global organisation gathering more than 110 automotive and ICT companies. The signing ceremony took place during the 5GAA's Connected and Automated Driving Workshop in Berlin. 5GAA is committed to testing, developing and promoting vehicle-to-infrastructure communication solutions and it will jointly work with the City of Torino, hotbed of frontier innovation and experimentation of autonomous driving and connected mobility in urban settings.



### 10 – 11 June Tel Aviv

Paola Pisano, Deputy Mayor for Innovation and Smart City Project, took part as a speaker in the Tel Aviv EcoMotion Week giving a speech in the panel entitled “MaaS - Cracking the Triangle - Municipality-Industry-Startup”. The event, dedicated to innovation in smart mobility, gathered more than 100 start-ups and over 3,500 attendees from all over the world.

### 22 July Munich

Deputy Mayor for Innovation and Smart City Project Paola Pisano attended the cluster meeting organized in Munich by the City of Ingolstadt in the frame of the Urban Air Mobility (UAM) Initiative, the European Innovation Partnership on Smart Cities and Communities (EIP-SCC) supported by the European Commission.

### 2 – 4 September Helsinki

The City of Helsinki hosted the WTCF - World Tourism Cities Federation network meeting. The main theme of the 2019 edition was intelligent tourism as a driving force for innovation and city development. Representing the City of Torino, Deputy Mayor for Commerce, Labour and Tourism Alberto Sacco gave a speech in the session on "Smart tourism city development: challenges and opportunities".

### 18 – 21 September Katowice

Deputy Mayor for Education Antonietta Di Martino attended the Executive Committee meeting of IAEC, the International Association of Educating Cities network. The Executive Committee members met to

prepare the 16th International Congress which will be held in Katowice in 2020.



### 8 – 9 October Helsinki

Mayor Chiara Appendino and Deputy Mayor for Culture Francesca Leon, together with representatives of Turismo Torino e Provincia, travelled to Helsinki to officially present Torino's candidature as European Capital of Smart Tourism 2020.



### 21 – 23 October New York

The City of Torino went on a mission to New York, together with representatives of Turismo Torino e Provincia and local stakeholders to promote Torino's specialties and investment opportunities in the field of innovation, environment and culture. During the event, organized in

partnership with the Consulate General of Italy in New York, the delegation showcased the rich programme of events of Torino City of Cinema 2020.

### 23 – 25 October Oslo

Deputy Mayor for Environment Alberto Unia took part in Oslo in the EUROCITIES Environment Forum entitled “Tackling the problem of plastic waste in cities”. The meeting was the occasion to work together with other cities to share inspiration and know-how on how to tackle the plastic waste problem. At the end of the meeting the City of Torino signed the Plastic Declaration restating its commitment to reducing the harmful impact of plastic waste.



### 29 – 30 October Belgrade

The new Deputy Mayor for Innovation and Smart City Project Marco Pironti went to Belgrade to participate as a speaker in the "5G and enabled technologies" conference organized by Confindustria Serbia. The event mainly focused on the application of 5G technology in telecommunications, industry and in the development of smarter cities, and on the use of blockchain technologies as a guarantee for privacy, security and transparency.

The international meeting gathered over 150 speakers and stakeholders from more than 60 countries sharing insights on topics ranging from innovative road construction techniques to road safety, from road charging to traffic management and connected and autonomous vehicles. The City of Torino was represented by Deputy Mayor for Innovation and Smart City Project Marco Pironti.

### 2 – 3 December Dublin

Deputy Mayor for Innovation and Smart City Projects Marco Pironti took part in the Ireland Smart City & IoT Forum held in Dublin giving a speech in the session entitled “How to win business in global Smart Cities”.



## FOREIGN DELEGATIONS

Several foreign delegations come every year to Torino, thanks to the various international relations that the City has established and to its cooperation with Consulates and Embassies. The meetings carried out promote a continuous exchange of experiences and are an opportunity to plan and develop cooperation agreements and projects.

In 2019 the City of Torino hosted 58 foreign delegations coming from 40 countries. It had the honour to welcome, among several foreign guests, some outstanding personalities: Kersti Kaljulaid, President of the Republic of Estonia, and His Highness Sultan bin Muhammad Al Qasimi, Ruler of Sharjah and member of the UAE Supreme Council.

As a confirmation of the strong and fruitful relations established with friend and twin cities, Torino hosted on the occasion of institutional meetings Eva Bolander, Lord Provost of Glasgow, Enkhbat Lamzav, Mayor of Kharkhorin and Gochoo Ganbold, President of the Uvurkhangai Region as well as technical and political delegations coming from the Cities of Bethlehem, Chambéry, Cologne, Córdoba, Detroit, Glasgow, Haifa, Kharkhorin, Nagoya, Rotterdam, Shenzhen and Volgograd.

Moreover, 30 Ambassadors and Consuls General coming from around the globe were received to plan shared activities in the field of trade, culture, academic cooperation and tourism.

In 2019 Torino played host to many international events. In May it hosted the Korea Week, an initiative promoted by the Embassy of the Republic of Korea, the Korean Cultural Institute, the Consulate General of the Republic of Korea in Milan, the City of Torino and the Fondazione per la Cultura Torino which, through a diverse programme of events, gave residents and visitors the opportunity to experience one of the most fascinating countries in the Far East. The City of Torino also organized the third edition of Torino Design of the City, having as main theme the City of the Future and the international scope of design, with a lively debate arising during the International Forum from the exchange with the cities of Detroit, Saint Étienne, Cape Town, Kortrijk, Singapore and Shanghai. Moreover, in October Torino played host to the fourth edition of the Turin Islamic Economic Forum featuring eight sessions with insights and debates on topics such as new urban and social impact policies, artificial intelligence, fintech, blockchain and Islamic creative economy with a scientific focus on Islamic finance.

The Association, having its headquarters in Chamonix, has as its main objective the international exchange of information on sustainable tourism. Its main activities are international conferences as well as tourist, sports, cultural and social events. The City of Torino joined the association in 2000.

## LUCI – Lighting Urban Community International

The international association brings together 70 cities and 40 lighting professionals engaged in using light as a major tool for sustainable urban, social and economic development. Torino has been a member of the network since 2002 with the Luci d'Artista light festival.

### Activities in 2019

- Delegates from the City of Torino attended the “Cities under Microscope” event and the Art & Culture Pillar held in Rotterdam.
- The City of Torino took part in the Lyon Light Festival Forum during the annual Fête des Lumières.
- A representative of the network gave a speech at the workshop organized in Torino during the Contemporary Art Torino+Piemonte week in the framework of the NUR project.

# **INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS**





## ITC – ILO International Training Centre of the International Labour Organization

The International Labour Organization and the Italian Government founded the International Training Centre in Torino in 1964 as an institute of advanced vocational training.

The Centre actively works to strengthen capacities and expertise of governments, workers' and employers' organizations and other stakeholders in the field of labour, social justice and sustainable development. Every year it offers more than 450 programmes and projects to nearly 14,000 people from over 190 countries; from the beginning of its activity until today, more than 220,000 people have been trained at the Centre, in the regions or remotely. The residential activities are held at the Torino Campus, built in 1961 and consisting of buildings arranged in five groups representing the continents of origin of the participants: Americas, Africa, Asia, Europe and Oceania. Cutting-edge teaching premises include a modern Conference Centre for congresses, seminars, workshops and media events organized by the United Nations System and other institutions.

Since 2010 the Centre has established the Turin School of Development, a partnership with other UN agencies (UNESCO, WIPO, World Bank, UNCITRAL and UNIDROIT), the University and the Politecnico of Torino to offer postgraduate courses, gathering every year in Torino about 250 participants coming from all over the world.

## UNSSC United Nations System Staff College

The United Nations System Staff College, established by the UN General Assembly in 2002, is a centre of excellence for training and knowledge management within the UN System. Each year the learning initiatives offered by the Staff College including courses, workshops and conferences reach over 10,000 beneficiaries. Its learning programmes focus on those leadership and management skills needed to effectively serve as an international civil servant, as well as on thematic issues spanning the three pillars of the UN's work: peace and security, human rights and sustainable development. In particular, since 2015 all of the College's learning and training activities have been promoting change and innovation within the UN System in order to provide its staff with those specific skills that enable them to better address the challenges posed by the adoption of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

## UNICRI United Nations Interregional Crime and Justice Research Institute

Established in 1968, UNICRI is an independent institute that addresses the needs of the international community formulating and implementing improved policies and actions in the field of justice, crime prevention, human rights and sustainable development. The Institute, based in Torino, conducts training and project management activities addressed to participants from all over the world and has a liaison office in Rome and offices in Algiers, Amman, Brussels, Geneva, Manila, Nairobi, Rabat, Tashkent and Tbilisi.

UNICRI produces research, policies, strategies and good practices; it delivers training activities, technical assistance and tools contributing to attain the goals of the 2030 UN Agenda, in particular as regards security, social cohesion, reduction of vulnerabilities and socio-economic development. Main focus of its activity is the exchange of expertise among countries, local institutions, the scientific community, civil society and the private sector for the development of joint actions according to a multidisciplinary approach. Strengthening justice, fighting violent extremism, preventing illicit trafficking and transnational organized crime, promoting assets recovery, mitigating the risks related to the criminal use of new technologies and chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear materials (CBNR), counterfeiting cyber crimes and crimes against the environment are among the Institute's current priorities. Moreover, great attention is paid to the victims of crime, children and young people at risk and to gender policies.

In 2019 UNICRI continued its action to prevent and counter terrorism in the Sahel-Maghreb region, identifying the most

effective causes and measures to reduce the phenomenon. The Institute started a new project in Mali for the rehabilitation of violent extremists and the prevention of radicalization phenomena in the communities, in particular with training and awareness-raising activities addressed to young people. Within the first world initiative on the existing links between crime and terrorism, UNICRI tested and produced, during a pilot training session held in Torino, a political-operational tool to counteract the phenomenon.

In the framework of the EU CBRN Risk Mitigation Centres of Excellence Initiative, UNICRI continued its actions to strengthen the prevention capacities of the 62 partner countries; moreover, 10 countries established national action plans. In 2019 UNICRI launched two new projects to prevent and combat the illicit trafficking of radiological and nuclear material in the Middle East, Georgia, Moldova and Ukraine. It also organized an international meeting on infrastructure protection against attacks with weapons of mass destruction.

It developed a programme on crime prevention in tourism destinations in 11





countries of Central America, Mexico and the Caribbean through training activities, the creation of a cooperation network and the adoption of a common methodology.

The Institute worked with Tunisia, Libya, Egypt and the Camden Asset Recovery Inter-Agency Network for the recovery of assets stolen by corrupt officials. Moreover, it contributed to the training of justice personnel of EU countries through analytical activities aiming at investigating and prosecuting intellectual property crimes. UNICRI carried out several activities to sensitise people on the risks and benefits of artificial intelligence and robotics, publishing a report in collaboration with INTERPOL focusing on the ethically responsible integration of AI into law enforcement and on the practical experiments implemented; in Dubai the Institute organized a first specialized training to enhance judicial knowledge on AI and in The Hague it launched a world hackathon for peace, justice and security with a focus on video manipulation.

The Institute also created an international network on the risks of criminal use of new technologies such as blockchains, biotechnologies, use of drones and 3D printing and on the security of the supply chain.

In Italy UNICRI carried out many specialist training activities such as the Master of Laws in Transnational Crime and Justice and courses on environmental crimes, migration, human rights and food security.

## ETF European Training Foundation

The ETF, established in 1994, is a decentralised agency of the European Union based in Torino. It employs approximately 130 staff and its mission is to develop the EU external relation policies in about 30 countries located in Eastern Europe, Central Asia and North Africa, promoting their political stability through the development of human capital. To meet its objective, the ETF supports its partner countries in the reform of education, training and labour market systems providing assistance and supporting the decision-making processes towards a more inclusive social and economic development.

The ETF locally supports and plans events connected to training and employability. In 2019 it celebrated its 25 years of activity with “Torino Skills City: dialogue on the future of work and skills”, an event organized in collaboration with the City of Torino and ITC ILO to make Torino an international centre of discussion about the future of work and skills. Moreover, in 2019 the European Training Foundation actively participated in the Technology Festival organized by the Politecnico of Torino and collaborated with the University of Torino on a wide range of initiatives including the Turin Islamic Economic Forum.

Finally, in November 2019, the ETF organized the conference entitled “Skills and qualifications - benefits for people”, attended by 26 partner countries, international organizations such as UNESCO, ITC ILO, OECD and African Union as well as by representatives of the Metropolitan City of Torino, the Piedmont Region, Confindustria Piemonte, Forma Piemonte and University of Torino.

Torino is a city offering an amazing line-up of events all year round. It's a modern and fascinating city with a vibrant cultural scene, regularly hosting well-established successful events such as the International Book Fair, Biennale Democrazia, MITO SettembreMusica, Torino Jazz Festival, Torino Film Festival as well as major contemporary art rendezvous such as ContemporaryArt Torino Piemonte, Luci d'Artista and Artissima. Thanks to its diverse programme of events, Torino confirmed also in 2019 its leading role internationally, drawing a significant number of foreign visitors and attracting at local level a huge number of citizens.

**Palazzo Madama - Civic Museum of Ancient Art** displayed the multimedia exhibition on "Notre-Dame de Paris. Gothic sculptures from the famous cathedral" dedicated to the theme of French gothic sculpture in the first half of the XIII century,

organized in collaboration with the Musée de Cluny – Musée national du Moyen Âge in Paris.

The **GAM - Civic Gallery of Modern and Contemporary Art** hosted in its gardens the installation of the Saudi artist Muhannad Shono entitled "The Caliph seeks Asylum", a site-specific work made of about 3,500 pipes built on a makeshift camp site.

The **Castello di Rivoli - Museum of Contemporary Art** presented the exhibition "Michael Rakowitz. Imperfect binding", the first European retrospective dedicated to the Iraqi-American artist. Created in collaboration with the Whitechapel Gallery in London, the exhibition brought together the artist's most important works inspired by architecture, archaeology, cuisine and geopolitics from ancient times to the present.

Some of the most prestigious European and non-European museums lent their precious images, artefacts, books and miniatures to



the **MAO - Museum of Oriental Art** to set up the exhibition entitled "Drop by drop life falls from the sky. Water, Islam and Art" focusing on the relationship between water and Islam, from its most ancient origins to its many developments, up to the most recent needs.

The **Egyptian Museum** continued its activity of scientific research and cultural heritage dissemination through the collaboration with major museums and cultural institutions worldwide. In 2019 it welcomed more than 850,000 people offering them the opportunity to visit the permanent collection, the temporary exhibitions as well as to attend the several lectures and workshops featuring international experts.

**Palazzo Chiabrese** hosted the exhibit on "Konrad Mägi. The light of the North", dedicated to the Estonian artist renowned for his expressive strength. The exhibition fell close to the 100th anniversary of the artist's visit to Italy and with over fifty works was one of the biggest personal shows ever made in Europe.



The **PAV - Park of Living Art** presented "Ecologies of Loss", the first Italian solo

exhibition of the Indian artist Ravi Agarwal, who through his work explored vital issues of our times such as ecology, society, urban and rural spaces, and capital.

The **Fondazione Sandretto Re Rebaudengo** hosted "The Promised Land", the first solo show in Italy of Michael Armitage, a young artist born in Nairobi whose works are grounded in the contradictory dynamics of contemporary Kenya. In his paintings, personal memory and firsthand experience in Kenya are combined with the urgent realities depicted by the media, creating an imaginary made of violence and social unrest, but also one of hope.

The **Fondazione Merz** presented the collective exhibition of Bertille Bak, Mircea Cantor, David Maljković, Maria Papadimitriou and Unknown Friend, the five finalists selected for the Art Section of the Mario Merz Prize's third edition. The exhibit included different styles and formal solutions from multiple stories and individual evolutions united by a powerful interrogatory force aimed at the present.

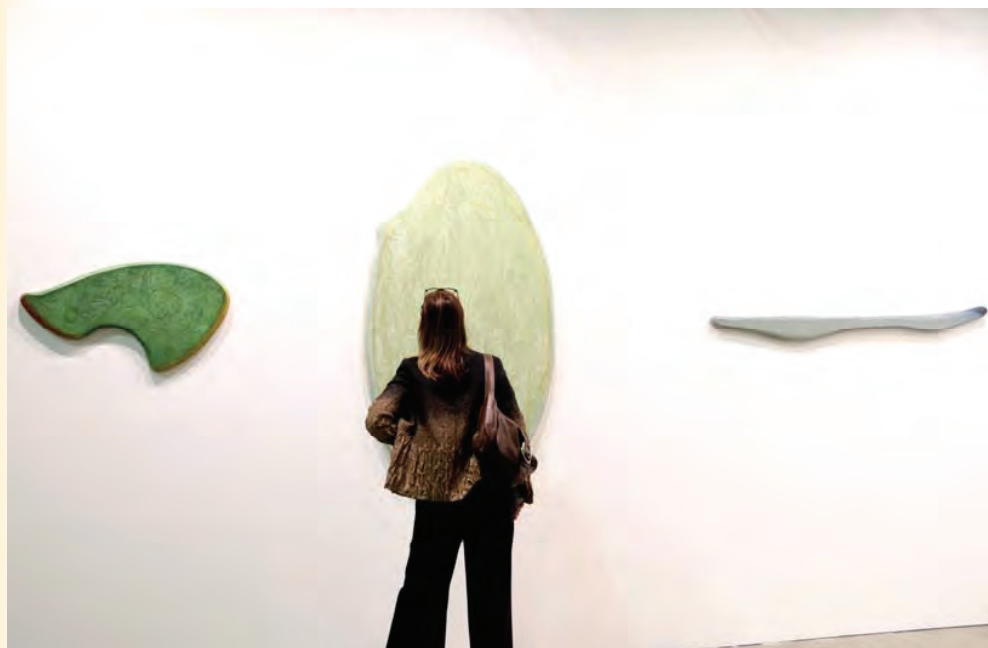
The **Pinacoteca Agnelli** displayed "Hokusai, Hiroshige, Hasui: Journey through a Changing Japan". The exhibit, featuring a selection of more than 100 extraordinary woodblock colour prints made by the three masters, took visitors on a journey through the most evocative places in Japan, both real and imaginary.

The **National Cinema Museum** celebrated Cristina Làstrego and Francesco Testa's art with a tribute to their most famous creation, "Mirò the Cat". The exhibit dedicated to the cartoon that saw the light under the Mole Antonelliana followed its creative process from the original idea to the story board, from the expressions on the characters'

faces to the projects of the theme park in China in the city of Yancheng developed using Miro's adventures as a starting point.

The **Promotrice delle Belle Arti** hosted "The Art of the Brick", an exhibit with over 80 works by the American Nathan Sawaya, the first artist to bring the famous LEGO® bricks into the art world. The exhibition has fascinated so far over one and a half million visitors in the United States, Australia, Asia and Europe.

Internationally recognized for the attention it pays to experimental practices and as a springboard for emerging artists and research galleries, **Artissima** attracts every year collectors, professionals and enthusiasts. In its 26th edition it focused on the duality of desire/censorship as a transversal theme and hosted a total of 208 galleries from 43 countries, with 62% of foreign exhibitors.



In the week dedicated to contemporary art Torino hosted the 7th edition of **Flashback**, contemporary fair of ancient and modern art, entitled "The Wanderers"; **Dama**, independent project created by international emerging art galleries; **Flat**, international event dedicated to art publications featuring 49 exhibitors from 16 countries.

**Paratissima**, international showcase of independent artists, celebrated its 15th edition entitled "Multiversity" investigating on the existence of multiple points of view and on the possibility of contemporary art to generate new visions, possible and imaginary scenarios. The selected artists exhibited their works in the spaces of the former Accademia Artiglieria which also hosted 7 different sections and workshops dedicated to children and families.



**The Others**, meeting point between market and cultural innovation, brought together more than 40 galleries and cultural associations from all over the world. The ninth edition took place in the former Alessandro Riberi Military Hospital.

**Luci d'Artista** in its 22nd edition, featured a new lighting installation entitled "M I R A C O L A" designed by the internationally renowned artist Roberto Cuoghi. The artwork was exhibited in the city centre and paid tribute to the Leonardo da Vinci's theories on the relationship between light and shadow in the year of the celebrations for the 500th anniversary of his death.

"Geographies" seen as a journey into music through space, different languages, traditions and destinations was the main theme of the thirteenth edition of **MITO SettembreMusica**. The international music festival recorded 74,000 spectators in Milan and Torino over 17 days, staging 128 concerts out of which 50 sold out.

The season of the **Teatro Regio** was characterized by 17 titles including 7 new productions: a journey from ballet to musical spanning from the French traditional Opera to the great Italian repertoire.

Caring for others, merging with different cultures and searching for new forms of spirituality were the core themes of the 2019 edition of the **Torinodanza Festival**. The programme included 19 titles for 36 performances, 9 different show venues, 7 national premieres, 2 international co-productions, 11 countries involved and over 200 artists, operators and technicians.

The **Teatro Stabile** season offered a wide-ranging programme covering different forms of expression and bringing to the stage 74 performances including 17 productions, 38 guest shows and 19 productions for the Torinodanza Festival. The Teatro Stabile also produced Uncle Vanja by Anton Čechov directed by Kriszta Székely, director of the Katona Theater in Budapest, in her first performance in Italy.

9 days of festival, 60 free concerts, 250 musicians involved and over 25,000 spectators marked the seventh edition of the **Torino Jazz Festival** featuring for the first time ever the Torino Jazz Festival Piemonte preview in different locations across the region, the use of new venues and open-air events conceived to make the public rediscover new urban spaces.

"Fluctus, the different aspects of a journey" was the exciting theme of the 24th edition of the **Festival delle Colline Torinesi - Torino Creazione Contemporanea**. More than 4,000 people enjoyed the 24 shows, meetings and special projects on the bill, including 8 national premieres.

**Languages on stage!**, the European Student Festival of Plurilingual Theatre aiming to educate young people to European citizenship, knowledge and respect for different cultures through arts, gathered in Torino students coming from Italy, Ireland, France, Germany, Greece and Romania.



The **Fondazione Teatro Ragazzi e Giovani** launched its new season with the first Italian performance of “Journey to the Center of the Earth” by the Roseland Musical Company of Barcelona, a highly original show with an innovative visual and danced language inspired by one of the most famous works of the father of science fiction: Jules Verne.

**Incanti**, international Puppet Theatre Festival, continued to explore the idea of travel in a broad and metaphorical sense ranging from literature and philosophy to the meaning of migration. In its 26th edition, it featured companies coming from Canada, Peru, Spain, France, Switzerland and Italy.

The 32nd edition of the **International Book Fair** offered visitors the narrative of the contemporary world through the words of writers, scientists, journalists and artists. Over 148,000 people attended the event while other 27,000 visitors took part in the 530 off events organized across the city.

The fifteenth edition of **Torino Spiritualità**, entitled “To endless night”, offered the public a fascinating night tour with lectures, readings, dialogues, personal experiences, stories and meetings exploring the great and ambivalent beauty of night. The festival recorded an audience of over 22,000 people, with 110 events held in 35 different venues all over the city.

**Biennale Democrazia**, in its sixth edition themed “The Visible and the Invisible”, reflected on the new inputs and on the distortions produced by the very high-visibility world we live in. The event engaged around 38,000 people in different venues around the city.

The 37th edition of the **Torino Film Festival** confirmed its international vocation hosting 191 films featuring 45 world premieres. The movie “Hvítur, hvítur dagur/A white, white day” by Hlynur Pálmason (Iceland/Denmark/Sweden) won the Best Movie award. **TorinoFilmLab**, the year-round international laboratory that supports emerging talents from all over the world, celebrated its eleventh edition.



The OGR cultural hub hosted the twentieth edition of **View Conference**, the international event dedicated to animation industry, special visual effects, virtual reality, digital design and video games. The programme included 20 workshops and masterclasses, with over 80 speakers, more than 100 hours of advanced training and a concert directed by the Academy Award winning composer Michael Giacchino.

**Film Commission Torino Piemonte**, in its nineteenth anniversary, supported 172 productions ranging from cinema movies and TV series to documentaries and commercials, also hosting a huge international production, The King’s Man by Matthew Vaughn. Moreover, it was involved in the organisation of the 23rd edition of “Cartoons on the Bay”, the international cross-media and children’s television festival that in 2019 had the United States as guest country.

The fifth edition of **Today’s**, with over 35 hours of music, art and performances, featured 26 internationally-renowned artists, 20 single-date concerts in Italy and 3

European premieres in an unconventional and extraordinary music show.

**Club to Club**, the international festival of avant-garde music and new pop, celebrated its 19th anniversary with more than 50 shows, 16 exclusive performances and 11 Italian premiers gathering overall more than 100 artists from all over the globe. The festival was characterized by a varied audience with over 30,000 participants from 45 different countries.

The **Kappa FuturFestival**, summer event of electronic music and digital arts, was the first Italian festival to receive in 2019 the prestigious DJ Awards in the International Music Festival category. The festival, in its eighth edition, brought together over 60,000 fans at the Parco Dora.

The fourteenth edition of **Movement Torino Music Festival**, the autumn festival of contemporary music and visual arts, involved 30 artists who performed in front of an audience of over 25,000 people coming from over 30 different countries.





# SPORT





The City of Torino has long been committed to organizing sporting events at national and international level, in collaboration with federations, sport promotion bodies and associations. Torino has over 200 sport facilities including swimming pools, polyfunctional centres and gyms daily available to the thousands of people training as amateurs and professionals.

In 2019 Torino successfully hosted the European Masters Games, the international sport event gathering sports enthusiasts aged over 30 from all over the world. Aim of the event, which took place from 26 July to

4 August, was the promotion of physical activity and of core values triggered by sport such as inclusion, respect and fairness.

As a confirmation of the leading role it plays on the international sporting scene, from 2021 to 2025 Torino will host the ATP Finals following a successful 12-year stint in London. Beating off the competition from Manchester, Tokyo, Singapore and London, Torino will stage the prestigious tournament featuring the world's best eight singles players and doubles teams of the season.



## 21 - 26 January Para Ice Hockey International Tournament

Italy, South Korea, Norway and Slovakia animated the eighth edition of the tournament at the PalaTazzoli arena, the last test before the World Cup in April. The South Korean team won the final match 3-1 against Italy.



## 26 January Thai Boxe Mania

The greatest international champions of muay thai and thai boxing stepped into the ring for the tenth edition of the exciting show combining sport and entertainment.

## 8 - 10 February ISU Short Track Speed Skating World Cup

Around 220 athletes from 32 countries competed in the ISU Short Track Speed Skating World Cup's final stage. Italy played a leading role thanks to the third consecutive victory in the women's 500 meters achieved by Martina Valcepina.

## 8 - 10 February Foil World Grand Prix - Inalpi Trophy

The American Race Imboden and the Italian Alice Volpi claimed gold at the men's and women's foil competitions of the Inalpi

Trophy, which took place for the first time at the Pala Alpitour arena with over 2,000 spectators.



## 10 - 11 February International Regatta D'Inverno sul Po

Held under the slogan "Warm up your winter", the 36th edition of the international regatta on the river Po saw the participation of foreign teams from the United Arab Emirates, France, Germany, Greece, Israel, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom and Switzerland.



## 29 - 31 March Europe Cup - Final Six

The best six women's water polo national teams from Italy, Hungary, the Netherlands, Russia, Spain and Greece competed at the Pala Nuoto swimming hall. The Netherlands clinched the gold medal.



### 31 March Santander La Mezza di Torino

About 6,000 runners took part in the fifth edition of the race which included, in addition to the traditional 21 km run, also the 10 and 5 km runs and the second edition of the sprint duathlon.



### 30 April – 1 May International Gold Master of Dance

The Pala Ruffini arena hosted the 19th edition of the international competition of Caribbean dances, Latin shows, freestyle and traditional smooth dances performed by amateur and professional dancers.

### 3 – 5 May International Turin Curling Cup

27 teams from Italy, France, Switzerland, Russia, the Czech Republic and Norway competed at the PalaTazzoli arena in the seventh edition of the Winter Olympics sport originated in Scotland.

### 5 May Tutta Dritta foot race

The 17th edition of the 10 km running race, first stage of the Royal Marathon, was characterized by a straight and charming route running through the streets of Torino.

### 15 June – 21 July Balon Mondial

32 men's and 8 women's teams took to the pitch for the 13th edition of the football world cup of migrant communities living in Torino. The men's tournament was won by Peru, the women's one by Italy.

### 22 – 24 June Caribbean Dances Contest

First edition of the dance festival involving athletes from Russia, the Ivory Coast and Iran competing in different styles such as salsa, merengue and Caribbean show.

### 8 – 14 July XII MA-BO Trophy

The twelfth edition of the international women's tennis tournament was won by the Japanese athlete Yuki Naito who defeated the Italian Elisabetta Cocciaretto in the final match.

### 12 – 13 July Drone Grand Prix

Torino, for the first time ever, hosted the Drone Champions League. Eight teams of pilots, coming from all over the world, competed in races characterized by amazing flight exhibitions, obstacle dodging and circuits completed at supersonic speeds.

### 12 – 14 July Turin Acro Cup

The Pala Ruffini arena hosted the seventh edition of the international acrobatic gymnastics event with the performances of 350 athletes representing 9 countries.

### 26 July – 4 August European Masters Games

The international sport event, which takes place every four years in a different country, involved a total of 28 federations and sports clubs. Around 7,000 athletes competed in 30 different sports including archery, swimming and athletics also for Paralympic athletes.



### 28 July International Long-Distance Cycling Race

The fifth edition of the cycling race was included in the European Masters Games programme. The riders competed in two routes running across the city: a 90 km and a 120 km path, both starting from the Medieval Village and arriving at the top of the Superga hill.



### 4 August Triathlon Grand Prix

The fascinating setting of the Parco del Valentino hosted the second stage of the Triathlon Grand Prix, won by the Australian athlete Marcel Walkington in the men's category and by Carlotta Missaglia in the women's category.

### 12 – 15 September International Wheelchair Curling Tournament

Teams from China, Russia and Italy competed for gold in the first edition of the tournament, ahead of the Beijing 2022 Winter Paralympics.

### 5 – 8 December ISU Grand Prix of Figure Skating

The Palavela arena hosted the best skaters in the world who competed in the finals of men's singles, ladies' singles, pair skating and ice dance for an overall number of 72 athletes coming from ten countries.

### IREN GROUP

IREN Group, one of the main multiutilities in the Italian panorama, operates in the fields of electricity (production, distribution and sale), thermal energy for district heating (production and sale), gas (distribution and sale), management of integrated water services, environmental services (waste collection and disposal) and services for local governments.

The Group is very active in terms of calls for innovation promoted at European level, which are being developed through a network of national and international partners. In 2019 IREN took part in 12 research and innovation projects under the Horizon 2020 and Life+ programmes, for a total multi-year commitment of around 3.8 million euros. The projects, actively involving about 60 employees, provide cooperation activities with business and academic centres in more than 120 European cities.

In 2019 the Group was actively involved in the following projects: STORE&GO, Pump-Heat, Planet and Chester as regards energy carrier networks integration, EVERYWH2ERE for alternative energy sources, WaterSpy for the water sector, BioMethER for environmental issues, NeMo (ended in 2019), INCIT-EV and eVolution2Grid on electric mobility and on-road charging of vehicles, EnergyShield on the issues on cyber security and 5G-Solution for IoT solutions related to mobility and energy sources.



### SMAT

SMAT Group manages the integrated water service of the City of Torino and other 291 municipalities of the Metropolitan City. The company is national leader in the areas of engineering, construction and management of diversified water sources, drinking water treatment plants, sanitation systems and recycling of urban waste water.

In 2019 SMAT, through its research centre and in partnership with local academic centres and European industrial stakeholders, carried out already-established as well as new projects thus strengthening its international activity both at European and non-European level.

In the frame of the Horizon 2020 programme, SMAT carried on the activities connected to the DEMOSOFC project, providing for the installation of the second and third solid oxide fuel cells. DEMOSOFC is the first industrial plant for the production of electricity from biogas generated by the treatment of waste water, using solid oxide fuel cells (SOFC), in order to obtain clean energy free from the emissions traditionally released from endothermic engines.

It also continued the activities foreseen by the AQUALITY project to effectively address the removal of contaminants of emerging concern from water, aiming at training 15 highly-skilled scientists to face present and future challenges concerning the protection of water resources from contaminants of emerging concern and related processing products.

2019 saw the end of the BLOWYSE (Biocontamination Integrated cOntrol Wet sYstem for Space Exploration) project, foreseeing the development of kits for the instantaneous detection of water biocontamination level. Through the project SMAT developed a system for the integrated biocontamination control of water and humid areas, i.e. surfaces where water is present as condensate. The prototype, designed for use on the International Space Station, will allow astronauts to test in real time the microbiological quality of water intended for consumption, which is currently manually sampled to be sent to Earth and analysed after several months.

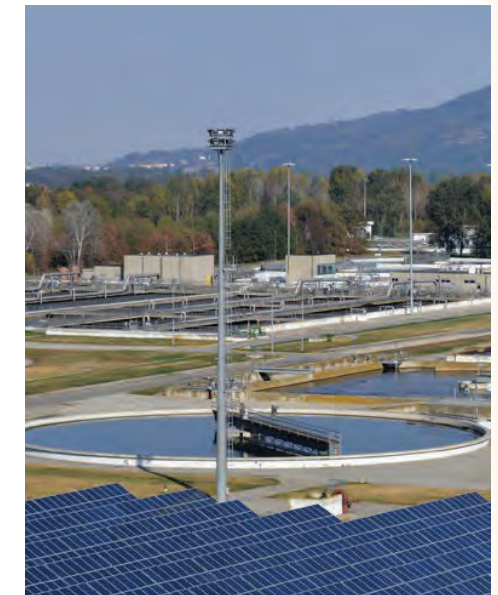
In the frame of POR-FESR funded European projects SMAT carried on the activities of Biogas4Energy (Biogas Purification and conditioning from the anaerobic digestion of sludges coming from waste water), the project aiming at developing a study complementing the DEMOSOFC project on biogas purification for applications in fuel cells and for the production of transport biomethane.

In 2019 SMAT started the BIOENPRO4TO (Bioenergy & Products for Torino – Smart Solutions for Smart Communities) project which aims to boost bioenergy and sustainable products deriving from the integrated valorisation of urban waste, industrial waste, biomass and waste water through a new generation of smart integrated modules.

Moreover, in 2019 the activities of the PERSEO (PErsonal Radiation Shielding for intErplanetary missiOns) project were completed. The project, carried out in partnership with the University of Pavia, had as main goal the creation of a wearable system able to shield the most radiosensitive organs from cosmic radiation which was worn by the Italian astronaut Paolo Nespoli on board the International Space Station.

In the field of international cooperation SMAT, together with the City of Torino, took part in the activities of Towns without Borders with the “Support to Kurdish Municipalities in northeast Syria and Iraqi Kurdistan” project.

SMAT also welcomed in its plants and research centre foreign delegations coming in particular from Denmark and Finland.





## GTT

GTT – Gruppo Torinese Trasporti – is a stock corporation wholly owned by the City of Torino through its subsidiary FCT Holding S.r.l., with a total staff of about 4,450 employees.

GTT manages an underground automated line, nearly 90 urban and suburban bus lines, 8 tram lines, 70 out-of-town bus lines and 2 railway lines, besides some parking areas and some tourist services such as the Sassi-Superga tramway and the panoramic elevator inside the Mole Antonelliana. Its transport services run from Torino to the provinces of Asti, Alessandria and Cuneo serving a total of 268 municipalities and more than 2.5 million residents. In 2018 the kilometres covered were approximately 61.5 millions for a total of about 284 million passengers.

In 2019 GTT and Woojin Metro CO, the Korean transport company managing the underground line operating in the suburbs of Seoul, signed a new Memorandum of Understanding on the maintenance of rolling stocks and staff training. Moreover, GTT carried on the cooperation activities with Tisséo Réseau Urbain, the company managing the underground line in Toulouse, and the trade and promotional exchanges with SNCF (French railways).

As part of the Horizon 2020 programme, GTT participated in the ART04-SHOW project for the management of fleets of self-driving vehicles, providing three pilot shuttle services serving the Torino hospital area.



## 5T

5T is the in-house providing company of the City of Torino, GTT – Gruppo Torinese Trasporti, Piedmont Region and Metropolitan City of Torino. It focuses on ITS solutions for integrated management of private and public mobility, offering expertise and services in the areas of traffic, infomobility, public transport and ticketing. The company manages the Mobility Center of the City of Torino and the Piedmont Region.

In 2019 5T enhanced its international relations taking part in several European projects and international events. As part of the IMOVE project 5T showcased, together with the City of Torino, the Torino MaaS Living Lab at the International Book Fair and at the General Assembly of the project held in Berlin; 5T also attended the final meeting of the SETA EU project, together with the City of Torino; finally, the company participated in the ITS World Congress, held in Singapore, and in the Open Session of the Calypso Network Association in Cannes, as a member of the Board of Directors.
