Today, the patterns that account for cities' distinct qualities and define their ranking in the global economy range from infrastructures to expertise and skilled human resources, from their capacity to innovate to the public services and entrepreneurial framework they are able to provide.

Torino is a city with an inclination for technological assets which looks at the opportunities provided by future economy, ready to tackle the challenges posed by globalisation and always ready to develop a great international dimension.

Torino has always stood out in Europe as a vibrant and dynamic city. First capital of Italy, driving force for Italian unification and Italy's industrial city par excellence, it has been strategic for its development, in particular for the manufacturing industry. Then, over the last twenty years, the city has radically changed, thanks to urban and infrastructure transformations, to the revitalisation of its historical centre and to the renewal of industrial areas and suburbs. The new image of the city has also been championed by the 2006 Winter Olympics and by the celebrations of the 150th anniversary of Italian Unification in 2011.

The City has undergone a process focused on promoting the already existing manufacturing expertise located in the area as well as its internationally well-known academic and research centres.

Torino is a city with a top level academic education system renowned at European level. The University and the Politecnico of



Torino attract thousand of foreign students, on the one hand thanks to the high level university courses delivered and on the other hand to the international projects and events carried out across the year.

It is also home to UN world agencies and major international organizations. It has been hosting the International Labour Organization since 1964 and is a strategic area for the United Nations due to the presence of UNICRI, the United Nations Interregional Crime and Justice Research Center and ETF, the European International Centre supporting vocational training.

Torino is an international city excelling in innovation in the field of education, culture, economic diversification and tourism. It has a network of bilateral relations in the fields of trade, culture, tourism and cooperation and it holds twinning and agreements with 44 cities in the world. It is also home to 3 Consulates General - Romania, Morocco and Peru - and to 46 Honorary Consulates.

In a global and competitive market, local communities promoting open innovation policies, high quality education and shared knowledge are those that trigger and attract new investments and create prosperity.

This is the reason why Torino has chosen to be open to the world, constantly growing, importing and exporting its expertise, working to attract huge investments aimed at opening new research centres and productive activities and at supporting the local economic assets making the most of the instruments provided by the European Union.

A strategy which gave rise to the Open for Business strategic programme, conceived by the Municipality of Torino together with Piedmont Agency for Investments, Piedmont Region, Unione Industriale, Chamber of Commerce, University and Politecnico of Torino to foster new business set up and attract foreign investments in the metropolitan area.

Our City strongly believes in innovation and successfully competes in top-quality manufacturing areas such as aerospace, automotive industry, biomedical research, telecommunications and food.

Many foreigners have chosen Torino to run their business, conquered by a fully attractive territory improving the quality of life of people who have chosen it to live, study and invest in.

Being competitive in a globalized world is a great challenge that can be handled if we keep up with the fast pace of technological change.

Today Torino is an international metropolis of great opportunities.

HIGHLIGHTS

FOCUS IIC biennial congress

On 10-14 September Torino played host to the IIC 27th biennial congress on “Preventive Conservation: The State of the Art”, the international event addressing cultural heritage specific issues. After the editions of Vienna, Hong Kong and Los Angeles, Torino was chosen as location of the renowned congress due to its strong international profile, its strategic position and its commitment in the field of cultural heritage. During the five-day congress Torino welcomed more than 500 professionals and researchers coming from all over the world, out of which 100 selected speakers, coming from 53 countries including the United States, Australia, India, Mexico, China, Japan, Egypt, Korea, Canada, New Zealand, Russia, the Arab Emirates as well as the majority of European countries. The best minds in conservation from around the world met at the Politecnico of Torino to generate discussion and explore the biggest issues

that exercise the field, exchanging expertise, best practices, projects and the successful application of preventive conservation in museum and cultural sites, building and reinforcing relationships and capturing developments and changes in scientific understanding and practice. More than 60 posters, selected by the scientific committee and made by students and researchers, took part in the conservation’s international showcase. The scientific programme also included technical visits to local museums including the Valentino Castle, the Risorgimento Museum, the National Cinema Museum, the National Automobile Museum, the Royal Museums and the Venaria Royal Palace. The event was organized by IIC in partnership with the City of Torino, IGIIIC, the Centro Conservazione e Restauro La Venaria Reale and Turismo Torino e Provincia.

FOCUS Japan Week

From 19 to 25 October Torino welcomed the 43rd edition of the Japan Week, a full-packed event organized by the City of Torino and the International Friendship Foundation in Tokyo in collaboration with Fondazione Contrada Torino Onlus under the patronage of the Consulate General of Japan in Milan and the Italian National Tourism Board-ENIT, with the aim of promoting friendship, mutual understanding and peace through the Japanese culture. During the week citizens and tourists had the opportunity to discover the Japanese culture thanks to a rich programme of free cultural events, held in refined locations: from the traditional tea ceremony, in the wonderful Guard Room of Palazzo Madama, to the calligraphy, dance, percussion and samurai performances at the Piccolo Regio Puccini theatre; from the demonstrations and workshops at the Museum of Oriental Art to the exhibition held in Palazzo Barolo.

In addition, in order to foster cultural exchanges, Japanese artists visited schools, elderly and disability day care centres sharing Japanese arts and culture through workshops and demonstrations. Thanks to the cooperation with the Foreign Languages, Literature and Modern Culture Department of the University of Torino, more than 50 university students were engaged and assisted Japanese artists and guests, helping them interact with all the citizens who enthusiastically joined the events: the performances at the Piccolo Regio Puccini theatre were all sold out, the tea ceremonies recorded an audience of 700 people and the Museum of Oriental Art welcomed more than 5,000 people during the workshops. During the Japan Week a Business Forum was also held at the City Hall to present the new business opportunities offered by the Economic Partnership Agreement between the European Union and Japan.

23 January**Chinese New Year's Day**

The Chinese community living in Torino gathered at the Teatro Nuovo for "Embrace China", a great show with Chinese artists on tour to Italy and with guests coming from Beijing to celebrate the Chinese New Year. The project followed the Memorandum of Understanding signed between the City Administration and the Chinese and Italian-Chinese associations active in the area.

2 – 25 February**Richard Strauss Festival**

The City of Torino celebrated the famous composer and conductor with an interdisciplinary festival involving over thirty cultural institutions in 33 different events: music productions, performances of symphonies and chamber music, vocal and choral compositions, dramas and plays. The festival opened with a documentary exhibition held at the Vivaldi Auditorium, part of the National University Library, displaying over 150 documents and objects belonging to the musician.

19 – 23 February**Many languages, many cultures, one city**

On the occasion of the International Mother Language Day, proclaimed in 1999 by the UNESCO General Conference to promote linguistic, cultural and multilingual diversity, the City of Torino organized a rich programme of activities. Over 70 young students witnessed, in the City Council room, the cultural wealth of Torino taking the floor and giving a speech in the languages they normally use at home, at school and in their everyday life. Currently in Torino more than 140 languages are spoken.

23 February**Innovation for Change**

The City of Torino, with its Innovation and Smart City Department, participated in the

third edition of the "Innovation for Change" programme with two challenges addressed to interdisciplinary teams of students and researchers. The first one concerned the creation, development and promotion of a network of city sensors to provide new and more efficient services to citizens. The second one focused on robotics and artificial intelligence, tools designed to help municipalities in their transition to become a Smart City.

5 – 11 March**International Chamber Music Competition**

The concert hall of the Torino Conservatory of Music hosted the final phase of the prestigious biennial chamber music competition with more than 130 performers among the best young players on the international scene.

14 April**Connections. The eighth art**

The National Cinema Museum of Torino hosted the world premiere of "Connections. The eighth art", a major project on cultural innovation. The original production paved the way for a new interaction between artistic performances and top museums: cinema, fashion, design, technology, performing arts and museum spaces merged to create a new form of expression.

10 – 14 May**International Book Fair**

The 31st edition of the International Book Fair gathered over 1,200 publishers and exhibitors and featured 1,400 events overall. The 2018 edition focused on the theme "One day all this" and attracted prominent guests such as the Literature Nobel Prize winner Herta Müller, the sociologist and philosopher Edgar Morin, the Academy Award best directors Bernardo Bertolucci and Giuseppe Tornatore. France was the host country of the event.

11 – 12 June**Bocuse d'Or**

Torino hosted the European final of the renowned international haute cuisine competition. During the event, taking place alongside the World Pastry Cup, 20 young chefs winner of their respective national selections competed to access the world final scheduled in 2019 in Lyon.

27 June – 3 July**Torino Fashion Week**

Unmissable event for fashion lovers and industry professionals, the Torino Fashion Week gathered 80 emerging Italian and foreign designers who signed a "capsule collection" specifically created for the event, focusing on aesthetic and stylistic research, on the use of new and ethical materials and on art as an expression of fashion.

27 June – 15 July**Torino Estate Reale**

The second edition of the event presented a cross cultural offering combining different languages and artistic styles: from dance to theatre, from music to magic. The festival was opened by the St. Petersburg Klassika State Symphony Orchestra conducted by Maestro Kantorov.

20 – 24 September**Terra Madre Salone del Gusto**

The twelfth edition of Terra Madre Salone del Gusto, which brought together 7,000 delegates from 150 countries, had as guiding theme "Food for change", the relationship between food and climate change. Aim of the event was to prove the power of food in triggering a slow, peaceful and global revolution to change habits having a negative impact on the planet.

21 – 22 September**Open Innovation Summit**

In its second edition, the Summit explored the theme of "Entrepreneurial City". The event attracted international experts who shared successful practices, models and ideas on the strategies used by cities to promote innovation and inclusive growth and to remain competitive on the international stage. They also analysed the City Lab model applied to the City of Torino, an integrated system of actions carried out to transform the city into an open-air innovation lab.

1 – 5 October**Future Mobility Week**

With over 200 experts from all over Italy and Europe and with more than 3,000 operators in

the sector, Torino became the capital of hardware, software and services for the new mobility, aiming at changing habits, infrastructures as well the whole society and economy.

12 – 21 October

Torino Design of the City

In the European Year of Cultural Heritage, the City of Torino started a reflection on the theme of cultural accessibility and on the ability of institutions to open up to new audiences. Over 170 events including debates and reflection moments with different stakeholders culminated in the “International Accessibility Forum” hosted in the Auditorium of the University of Torino, also involving representatives from Copenhagen, Montreal, Graz and different Italian cities.

26 – 27 October

Climathon

Torino hosted the third edition of the 24-hour international hackaton on climate change and on the ability of cities to adapt to a continuously changing reality, organized by EIT Climate-KIC. The 2018 edition took place simultaneously in major cities around the world and in Torino the Environment Park organized the Main Stage entitled “The way we change”. The event connected key players from 116 cities in the world who jointly worked to design innovative solutions to city climate changes.

24 November 2018 – 6 January 2019

Torino Christmas Magic Show

The Masters of Magic World Tour, one of the most famous illusionism shows in the world, offered citizens and tourists a Guinness World Records performance featuring 30 international artists on stage, 100 minutes of magic with an audience of 15,000 people taking part in a magic trick. The two-hour show with cutting-edge illusionists closed “Torino Magic Christmas”, a programme full of fascinating events and performances for all ages that brought magic to the whole city.

BACAU – Romania

In 2007 the two Cities signed a Memorandum of Understanding in order to promote urban, social and cultural development and to support initiatives of integration addressed to the large Romanian community living in Torino.

BARCELONA – Spain

In 2005 a Memorandum of Understanding was signed to promote cooperation between the respective city markets, Porta Palazzo and La Boqueria. In 2017 the two Cities signed a cooperation agreement to strengthen their economic, cultural and academic relations with a special focus on technological innovation through the exchange of know-how.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ Delegates from the City of Barcelona and Mitrovica took part in a study visit in Torino focusing on local markets within a project covering the management of public spaces.
- ▶ The City of Torino attended the meeting of the CESBA MED project held in Barcelona. The last part of the event was dedicated to the presentation of the CESBA Neighbourhood Award 2018, organized by the Government of Catalonia.
- ▶ Deputy Mayor for Innovation and Smart City Project Paola Pisano took part in the Sharing Cities Summit held in Barcelona.
- ▶ The City of Barcelona was one of the guest cities of the third edition of Circonomia, the circular economy festival held at the Open Incet in Torino.

BETHLEHEM – The Palestinian Territories

In 2015 a Cooperation Pact was signed to support local development in the field of water management and commerce. The Pact followed a Letter of Intent expressing the will to reinforce cooperation between the two Cities.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ The Mayor of Bethlehem led a delegation to Torino for the beginning of a new project: NUR – New Urban Resources. Renewable energy for Bethlehem. A technical delegation from Torino subsequently visited Bethlehem to carry on the project activities.

CAMPO GRANDE – Brazil

In 2003 a Cooperation Agreement was signed in the academic, cultural, social and economic fields.

CANNES – France

Cannes and Torino, bound by historical cooperation relations, signed a Friendship Agreement in 2000, seeking to promote common projects on culture, sport and youth.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ Deputy Mayor for Commerce, Labour and Tourism Alberto Sacco attended the annual world's leading property market event, the MIPIM exhibition.

CHAMBÉRY – France

Torino and Chambéry are bound by a historical twinning signed in 1957. In 2015 the two Cities signed a Letter of Intent to further support the several activities, exchanges and projects carried out every year in different fields.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ The City of Torino participated in the public meeting organized in the framework of the “Marché des Continents” to present the results of the “Beyond the Walls: models of Integration” project.
- ▶ The Casa del Teatro Ragazzi e Giovani in Torino hosted the play “Chambéry 1914-1918” realized by students of the Lyceé Louise de Savoie and of the Conservatory of Chambéry.

COLOGNE – Germany

Twinning signed in 1958 to promote the path to European integration.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ The Chairman of the Torino City Council Fabio Versaci met a delegation of councillors from Cologne, visiting Torino on the occasion of the 60th anniversary of the twinning between the two Cities.
- ▶ The Albertus Magnus Gymnasium of Cologne took part in Languages on Stage!, the European student festival of multilingual theatre, held at the Casa del Teatro Ragazzi e Giovani.

CÓRDOBA – Argentina

Córdoba has historical relations with Torino due to Piedmontese emigration. The Twinning Agreement dates back to 1986 and on its 30th anniversary the two Cities signed a Letter of Intent.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ A delegation of over 60 engineering students came to Torino for study visits connected to the automotive sector.

DETROIT – USA

The two Cities have been twinned since 1998. The agreement is aimed at strengthening relations by promoting cultural, social and economic exchanges.

EKATERINBURG – The Russian Federation

The agreement was signed in 1998 in order to support and develop the cooperation between local management and economic institutions of both Cities.

ESCH-SUR-ALZETTE – Luxembourg

Twinning signed in 1958 to promote the path to European integration.

FORTALEZA – Brazil

Cooperation Pact signed in 2016 aiming to encourage the exchange of good practices in the field of smart cities.

GAZA – The Palestinian Territories

In 1996 the City of Torino committed itself to attempting a twinning with both an Israeli and a Palestinian city. Upon suggestion of the respective national authorities, Haifa and Gaza were chosen. The Twinning Agreement between Torino and Gaza was signed in 1999.

GJAKOVA – Kosovo

Cooperation Pact signed in 2015 to promote economic, academic, cultural and e-government cooperation.

GLASGOW – The United Kingdom

Between Glasgow and Torino, twin cities since 2003, exchanges are based on urban renewal, art and culture.

Activities in 2018

► Eva Bolander, Lord Provost of the City of Glasgow, visited Torino accompanied by members of the Italian Chamber of Commerce and Industry for the UK and by the UK Ambassador to Italy Jill Morris. The delegation met Mayor Chiara Appendino and Deputy Mayor for Commerce, Labour and Tourism Alberto Sacco. During the meeting an agreement was signed by the Torino Chamber of Commerce, the Glasgow Chamber of Commerce and the Italian Chamber of Commerce for the United Kingdom to further promote economic exchanges.

HAIFA – Israel

In 1996 the City of Torino started a twinning process with both an Israeli and a Palestinian city, and Haifa and Gaza were chosen. A Memorandum of Understanding was signed with Haifa in September 2005.

HARBIN – China

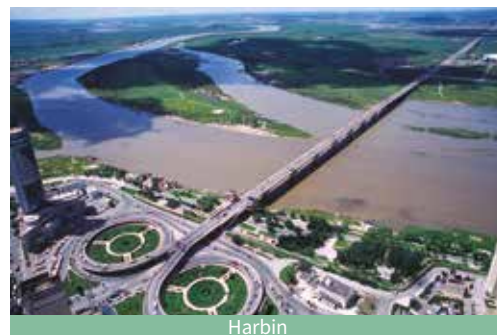
The relations with Torino arose in the industrial field but were also extended to the two municipalities, which signed a Letter of Intent in 2003.

KHARKHORIN – Mongolia

The City of Torino and the City of Kharkhorin signed in 2016 a Cooperation Pact to promote mutual activities in the field of tourism and culture, with historical, archaeological and inter-religious projects and training courses.

Activities in 2018

► Deputy Mayor for Culture Francesca Leon met a delegation of Kharkhorin visiting Torino for the press conference and opening of "The Capital of the Great Steppe" exhibit at the Museum of Oriental Art.

KIRKUK – Iraq

Cooperation Pact signed in 2016 in order to promote mutual projects in the field of trade, culture and university.

LIÈGE – Belgium

Twinning signed in 1958 to promote the path to European integration. The activities focus on youth exchanges in the framework of European projects.

LILLE – France

Twinning signed in 1958 to promote the path to European integration.

Activities in 2018

► Vice Mayor Guido Montanari gave a speech at the "Mayors committed for climate" roundtable organized in Lille on the occasion of the 60th anniversary of the twinning between the two Cities.

LYON – France

In 2012 Torino and Lyon renewed the Cooperation Agreement signed in 2007, supporting the rich history of academic, cultural and economic relations.

Activities in 2018

► Vice Mayor Guido Montanari met an institutional delegation headed by the Mayor of Lyon Georges Képénékian visiting Torino on the occasion of the Bocuse d'Or contest European final.

► The City of Torino took part in the Lyon Light Festival Forum organized within the Fête des Lumières festival, in the framework of the activities included in LUCI network and in the MONICA project.

► The City of Lyon was part of the Brand New City exhibit organized by the Urban Center Metropolitano in the framework of the ROCK project.

MAPUTO – Mozambique

The two Cities signed in 2015 a Cooperation Pact to promote projects on culture and tourism, trade, academic cooperation and environment.

NAGOYA – Japan

Torino and Nagoya have been twinned since 2005. The agreement focuses on mutual promotion and exchanges in the fields of business, culture, environment and design.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ Mayor Chiara Appendino and Vice Mayor Guido Montanari met a delegation from the City of Nagoya, headed by Mayor Takashi Kawamura. Delegates also attended the “Japan Business Forum” held at the City Hall and organized by the Torino Chamber of Commerce and had a series of meetings with representatives of the public authority focusing on urban agriculture.
- ▶ A delegation from the Nagoya City Art Museum was welcomed by the Director of the Torino Civic Gallery of Modern and Contemporary Art.

NANTES – France

In 2013 Nantes and Torino signed a Letter of Intent to promote mutual cooperation on cultural and environmental issues.

NICE – France

The two Cities signed in 2018 a Cooperation Pact in the field of culture, university, business

and innovation with particular focus on urban security and smart city. The agreement confirmed the Letter of Intent signed in 2015.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ A delegation from Nice, led by Deputy Mayor for International Affairs Rudy Salles, was welcomed in Torino for the signing ceremony of the Cooperation Pact.

PRAIA – Cabo Verde

In 2003 the Cities signed two Cooperation Agreements, a general one and a specific one for the Tira Chapeu district. The latter was supplemented in 2004 by a Protocol with ANCI – National Association of Italian Municipalities.

QUETZALTENANGO – Guatemala

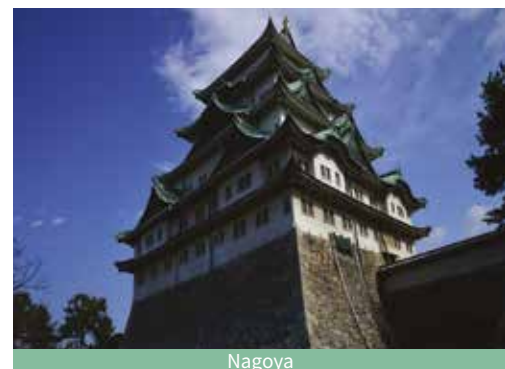

SAINT PETERSBURG – The Russian Federation

In 2012 the two Cities signed a multidisciplinary Cooperation Agreement. This agreement complements the Protocol of Cooperation between the Fondazione Torino Musei and the Hermitage Museum signed to allow the exchange of collections.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ Mayor Chiara Appendino and Deputy Mayor for Commerce, Labour and Tourism Alberto Sacco attended the St. Petersburg International Economic Forum, leading international event on business and finance.
- ▶ Mayor Appendino and Deputy Mayor Sacco met a delegation from St. Petersburg visiting Torino for a series of meeting with local companies and to attend the “Economic cooperation between Torino and St. Petersburg” congress organized by the Conoscere Eurasia association at the Torino Incontra conference centre.
- ▶ The City of Torino welcomed some delegates from the Sport Committee of St. Petersburg interested in discovering the sport policies carried out in Torino.
- ▶ The St. Petersburg E. S. Demmeni State Marionette Theatre took part with a puppet show in the 12th edition of the Flowers of Russia festival held at the Casa del Teatro Ragazzi e Giovani.
- ▶ The St. Petersburg Klassika State Symphony Orchestra opened the Torino Estate Reale summer festival.

SALT LAKE CITY – USA

The twinning with Salt Lake City was signed in 2006, aimed at exchanging experiences and encouraging meetings between the two communities.

SALVADOR DE BAHIA – Brazil

The historical presence of Piedmontese nonprofit organisations in Salvador de Bahia led the two Cities to sign, in 2003, a Cooperation Agreement to be added to the twinning agreement between the Piedmont Region and the State of Bahia.

SHENYANG – China

The twinning between Torino and Shenyang dates back to 1985. Over the years, several institutional meetings have strengthened the bond between the two Cities.

SHENZHEN – China

In 2007 the two Cities signed an agreement called The Two Bulls.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ Deputy Mayor for Youth, Integration and Equalities Marco Giusta took part in the Shenzhen Design Week.

SKOPJE – The Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia

In 2012 the two Cities signed a multidisciplinary Cooperation Agreement.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ Delegates from the City of Torino took part in the second policy workshop of the EUCANET project.
- ▶ The City of Skopje hosted the partners general assembly of the ROCK project, also attended by representatives from the City of Torino.

TIRANA – Albania

Cooperation Pact signed in 2016 to foster exchanges in the areas of trade, culture and university. The pact witnesses the long-established cooperation between the two Cities, already confirmed by a Letter of Intent signed in 2009.

TUNIS – Tunisia

In 2015 the two Cities signed a Cooperation Pact promoting relations in the field of trade, culture and urban development.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ The City of Tunis hosted the closing conference of the MENTOR project, involving the City of Torino as partner supporting regular migration by means of vocational training programmes.

ZLÍN – The Czech Republic

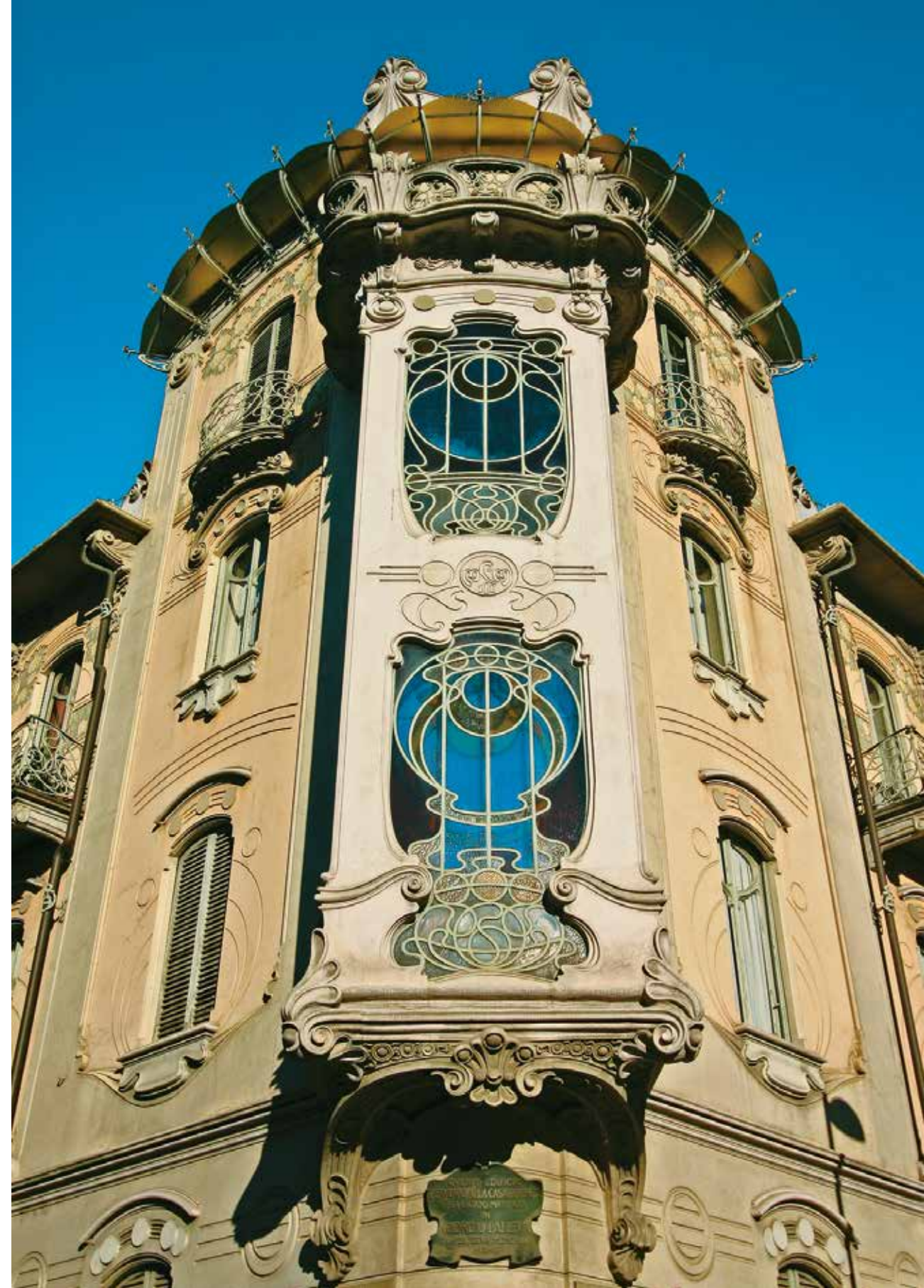
Agreement signed in 2004 to develop exchanges on cinema and audio-visual projects.

Cooperation within the IUC CITY-TO-CITY programme

The City-to-City initiative of the EU International Urban Cooperation programme aims to pair up EU with non-EU partner cities, promoting their access to expertise in urban development policy and helping cities promote smart, green and inclusive growth. Torino has been paired with the Consorcio Intermunicipal Grande ABC for the Latin-American area for the exchange of experiences on urban mobility and transport, and with Baltimore in the US for an exchange on social innovation and urban regeneration.

Activities in 2018

- ▶ A delegation led by the City of Torino and made up of Politecnico, 5T and Torino Wireless went to Brazil for the beginning of the project.
- ▶ Mayor Chiara Appendino, Deputy Mayor for Transport and Mobility Maria Lapietra and Deputy Mayor for Innovation and Smart City Project Paola Pisano met a delegation from the Consorcio Grande ABC in Torino for the press conference launching the project and for a series of study visits.
- ▶ Delegates from the City of Torino attended the European Week of Regions and Cities held in Brussels where they met the partner cities of Baltimore and Consorcio Grande ABC together with the other cities involved in the exchanges supported by the International Urban Cooperation programme.

Ambassador of Belgium to Italy

Several foreign delegations come every year to Torino, thanks to the various international relations that the City has established and to its cooperation with Consulates and Embassies. The meetings carried out promote a continuous exchange of experiences and are an opportunity to plan and develop cooperation agreements and projects.

In 2018 the City of Torino hosted 63 foreign delegations coming from 37 countries. It had the honour to welcome, among several foreign guests, some outstanding personalities: the Vice Chairman of the Ho Chi Minh City People's Committee, the Minister of International Trade of Canada, the Minister for Romanians Abroad and the Vice-Governor of the Province of Flevoland.

As a confirmation of the strong and fruitful relations established with friend and twin cities, Torino hosted on the occasion of institutional meetings Eva Bolander, Lord Provost of Glasgow, Georges Képénékian, Mayor of Lyon and Takashi Kawamura, Mayor of Nagoya, as well as several representatives coming from the Cities of Cologne, Córdoba, Glasgow, Lyon, Kharkhorin, Nice and St. Petersburg.

Moreover, 23 Ambassadors and Consuls General coming from around the globe were received in the City Hall to plan common activities in the field of trade, culture, academic cooperation and tourism.

In 2018 Torino played host to many international events. The 27th edition of the IIC congress gathered more than 500 professionals working in the field of heritage for a 5-day discussion on preventive conservation at the Politecnico of Torino and for a series of study visits to the Conservation and Restoration Center La Venaria Reale. In October Torino hosted the 43rd edition of the Japan Week, a fully packed week dedicated to Japanese culture featuring dance performances, music and exhibitions as well as the second edition of Torino Design of the City, focusing on the theme of cultural accessibility, with more than 170 meetings, fairs, workshops, lectures, movies and plays and over 150 local experts, institutions, associations and networks involved.

BOOSTINNO

During the Open Innovation Summit held in Torino, the project results were presented to the European Commission Directorates-General, the Agency for Territorial Cohesion, the URBACT Secretariat, EUROCITIES, OECD and World Bank members showcasing experiences of social innovation.

CESBA MED

The City of Torino, lead partner of the project, attended the partner meeting held in Barcelona also including the launch of the CESBA Award, delivering an overview on exemplary neighbourhoods in Europe and organized by the Government of Catalonia. It also took part in the conference held in Ljubljana and in the sprint workshop held in Malta.

COM'ON EUROPE

The City of Torino hosted the training course of the project and the press conference attended by Deputy Mayor for Youth, Integration and Equalities Marco Giusta. Moreover, some representatives from the City of Torino participated in the partner meeting and in the "European Youth Friendly Cities Conference" held in Thessaloniki, as well as in the meetings held in Maribor and Cascais.

G3P RELOADED

Local police, state police, financial police and prison officers met in Torino for a series of training courses and exchanges on hate crimes motivated by racism and xenophobia. The training activities foreseen by the project also included study visits to Belfast and Helsinki, partners of the project. The meeting in Belfast was attended by Deputy Mayor for Youth, Integration and Equalities Marco Giusta.

GOEASY

The Higher Institute Mario Boella in Torino hosted the general assembly of the project attended by the six partners, including the City of Torino.

IMOVE

The project, funded by the H2020 programme, launched in October the first Ideathon organized in collaboration with UITP, City of Torino, 5T and Y4PT-Youth for Public Transport. Aim of the event was to support innovative ideas and projects influencing the mobility sector in a dynamic and interactive framework and with the feedback from a pool of experts. The project partners also met in Athens to attend the general assembly.

MOLOC

On the occasion of the European Green Week, the City of Torino welcomed representatives from Lille, Hamburg, Suceava, the Central Mining Institute of Katowice and the Energy Cities network for a series of study visits to the main urban transformation projects carried out in Torino in the last 20 years. In June the partners gathered in Katowice for a second study visit on energy transition. Representatives from the City of Torino also took part in the study visits organized in Hamburg and Suceava, respectively focusing on innovative urban planning and on energy efficiency and sustainable urban mobility.

MONICA

Representatives from the City of Torino attended the general assemblies held over the year in Bonn, Leeds and Bratislava, presenting the tests made in Torino during the Kappa FuturFestival and the movida in the San Salvario district. Partners also met in Copenhagen for the mid-term review meeting and to test the sound field control system during the Friday Rock at Tivoli Gardens. Torino hosted in November the Urban Spaces Hackathon on the movida nightlife phenomenon to find a good balance between amusement, safety and quality of public spaces. In December the City of Torino went to Lyon for the pilot study conducted during the traditional Fête des Lumières.

NOVELOG

Brussels hosted the final conference of the project, where the City of Torino presented its experience as pilot city. The event took place in the framework of the “CIVITAS Urban Freight Conference”, the interactive event on urban logistics organized by the POLIS European network.

NEYC MEETUP 2018

The City of Torino attended the preparatory meeting held in Cascais, Portugal, and the meeting and “Romania Capital Youth Program” conference which took place in Cluj-Napoca, Romania. The meetings both focused on youth participation and consultation mechanisms in youth-friendly cities.

BEYOND THE WALLS: MODELS OF INTEGRATION

Piazza dei Mestieri, lead partner of the project, organized in Torino a three-day event to wrap up the project results and the actions developed together with Chambéry, Liege and Lyon. During the Marché des Continents held in Chambéry a public meeting was held to share the experiences on school inclusion and integration both in Italy and France. The City of Liège hosted a public meeting on the occasion of the 60th anniversary of the twinning with Torino to present the best practices of Italian and French schools while in June the National Research Council in Rome hosted the seminar entitled “Building a transnational community of educators to create a welcoming school for immigrant students”.

ROCK

The City of Torino showcased its territorial marketing strategies during the first seminar on city-branding organized in Vilnius. In May the City of Skopje hosted the partner general assembly also attended by representatives from the City of Torino, one of the seven cities exporting their models of cultural heritage regeneration and optimisation. In June the

partners met in Cluj-Napoca to discuss the participatory approaches applied to urban policies, the temporary uses of cultural heritage and the impact of mass events while in Berlin the ROCK project organized the “Cultural Heritage Connects!” workshop in the framework of the European Cultural Heritage Summit. In October Torino hosted the seventh seminar on city-branding, organized with the support of the Urban Center Metropolitan attended by the Cities of Liverpool and Vilnius, along with several Italian and foreign guests. Concurrently the Urban Center Metropolitan also opened the “Brand New City” exhibit.

SOCIALCAR

Vienna played host to the project final conference, which involved the City of Torino as partner and pilot city for new models and good practices of shared mobility. The event took place during the Transport Research Arena 2018, the largest conference on transport research in Europe.

SOLEZ

During the European Mobility Week Torino presented to the public the several actions carried out and the main goals of the SOLEZ project. The partners also met in Gdańsk to evaluate the planned activities and to participate in the congress on sustainable mobility.

STEVE

Representatives from the twenty-one organizations part of the project attended the consortium meeting held in Torino, which gave the partners the chance to catch-up with all of the activities and developments being implemented in the frame of the project. Torino also hosted “ECA2030 Electric Connected Automated Cars invented for the 2030 Customer”, the event gathering the automotive community and policy makers to discuss the technological evolutions, gaps and limits in the field of electric, connected and automated driving. During the European

Mobility Week held in Torino, the project achievements and results were disseminated. Moreover, representatives from the City of Torino also attended the partner meeting held in Munich.

ITC - ILO International Training Centre of the International Labour Organization

The International Labour Organization and the Italian Government founded the International Training Centre in Torino in 1964 as an institute of advanced vocational training.

The Centre actively works to strengthen capacities and expertise of governments, workers' and employers' organizations and other stakeholders in the field of labour, social justice and sustainable development. Every year it offers more than 450 programmes and projects to nearly 14,000 people from over 190 countries; from the beginning of its activity until today, more than 220,000 people have been trained at the Centre, in the regions or at a distance. The residential activities are held at the Torino Campus, built in 1961 and consisting of buildings arranged in five groups representing the continents of origin of the participants: Americas, Africa, Asia, Europe and Oceania. Cutting-edge teaching premises include a modern Conference Centre for congresses, seminars, workshops and media events organized by the United Nations System and other institutions.

Since 2010 the Centre has established the Turin School of Development, a partnership with other UN agencies (UNESCO, WIPO, World Bank, UNCITRAL), the University and the Politecnico of Torino to offer postgraduate courses, gathering every year in Torino about 250 participants coming from all over the world.

UNSSC United Nations System Staff College

The United Nations System Staff College, established by the UN General Assembly in 2002, is a centre of excellence for training and knowledge management within the UN System. Each year the learning initiatives offered by the Staff College including courses, workshops and conferences reach over 10,000 beneficiaries. Its learning programmes focus on those leadership and management skills needed to effectively serve as an international civil servant, as well as on thematic issues spanning the three pillars of the UN's work: peace and security, human rights and sustainable development. In particular, since 2015 all of the College's learning and training activities have been promoting change and innovation within the UN System in order to provide its staff with those specific skills that enable them to better address the challenges posed by the adoption of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

UNICRI United Nations Interregional Crime and Justice Research Institute

Established in 1968, UNICRI is an independent institute that addresses the needs of the international community formulating and implementing improved policies and actions in the field of justice, crime prevention and human rights. The Institute, based in Torino, coordinates specialized training activities addressed to participants from all over the world and has a liaison office in Rome and project offices in Algiers, Amman, Brussels, Geneva, Manila, Nairobi, Rabat, Tashkent and Tbilisi. UNICRI produces research, policies, strategies and good practices; it delivers training activities, technical assistance and tools contributing to attain the goals of the 2030 UN Agenda, as regards security, social cohesion, reduction of vulnerabilities and socio-economic development. Main focus of its activity is the exchange of expertise among countries,

local institutions, the scientific community, civil society and the private sector for the creation of platforms enabling the development of joint actions. Strengthening justice, preventing illicit trafficking and transnational organized crime, promoting assets recovery, mitigating the risks related to the improper use of new technologies and chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear materials, preventing violent extremism, counterfeiting, cyber crimes, hate crimes and crimes against the environment are among the Institute's current priorities. Trafficking in persons and gender policies are also issues addressed by UNICRI's programmes. Moreover, great attention is paid to the victims of crime, children and young people at risk. In 2018 UNICRI continued its action to prevent and counter violent extremism in the Sahel-Maghreb region and began cooperation projects with Indonesia, Jordan, Mali, Thailand, and Morocco to support the implementation of rehabilitation and reintegration programmes for violent extremist offenders in prison environments. In the framework of the EU chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear centres of excellence risk mitigation initiative, UNICRI continued its action to strengthen the institutional capacities of the 62 partner countries. It also implemented the project aiming at reinforcing crime prevention and response in tourism destinations in Central America, Mexico and the Caribbean and it worked with Tunisia, Libya, Egypt and the Camden Asset Recovery Inter-Agency Network in establishing new mechanisms to more effectively trace and recover illicit assets. Moreover UNICRI, in cooperation with the Netherlands and the Global Counterterrorism Forum, created the first guidelines to better understand the nexus between crime and terrorism, in the framework of the first world initiative on the issue. It also carried out several activities to sensitise people on the risks and benefits of artificial intelligence and robotics, on digitalisation and disarmament and it developed an international network on biotechnologies. In 2018 Maria Falcone, Italian Judge Giovanni Falcone's sister, was nominated as an advocate for UNICRI in the fight against organized crime.

ETF European Training Foundation

The ETF, established in 1994, is a decentralised agency of the European Union based in Torino. It employs approximately 130 staff and its mission is to develop the EU external relation policies in 29 countries located in Eastern Europe, Central Asia and North Africa, promoting their political stability through the development of human capital. To meet its objective, the ETF supports its partner countries in the reform of education, training and labour market systems providing assistance and supporting the decision-making processes towards a more inclusive development. It locally supports and plans events connected to training and employability. In 2018 it organized at the OGR cultural hub the conference entitled "Skills for the Future: managing Transition", in partnership with Compagnia di San Paolo and Politecnico of Torino. The event gathered 350 entrepreneurs, training providers and innovators coming from more than 50 countries to explore how transition countries can respond to global trends shaping the labour market of tomorrow, from a skills perspective. The European Training Foundation, in cooperation with ITC-ILO, promotes training projects addressed to members of international agencies and civil society working in the field of vocational education. Moreover, the University of Torino invited the ETF to share its know-how on the challenges posed by migration. On 27 September 2018 the ETF and the Metropolitan City of Torino signed a Memorandum of Understanding to carry out common actions in order to create a stronger connection between Europe and citizens, also promoting European policies, and in order to share the ETF activities and results at local level, in particular with the engagement of education and training institutions. In October 2018, in cooperation with VSP Onlus, and in the frame of the dual education programme, the ETF hosted some students from the local Domenico Berti foreign languages High School to disseminate information about the European Union and the ETF working areas.

Torino is a city offering an amazing line-up of events all year round. It's a modern and fascinating city with a vibrant cultural scene, hosting already established successful events such as the International Book Fair, the Terra Madre Salone del Gusto international food exhibit, MITO SettembreMusica, Torino Jazz Festival, Torino Film Festival as well as major contemporary art rendezvous such as ContemporaryArt Torino Piemonte, Luci d'Artista and Artissima. Thanks to its rich programme of events, Torino confirmed once again its leading role internationally, drawing a significant number of foreign visitors and also attracting at local level a huge number of citizens.

► **Palazzo Madama – Civic Museum of Ancient Art** hosted “Perfumum. The perfumes of history”, a collection of more than 200 items including jewellery, glassware and porcelain with the support of renowned national museums and of the Musée International de la Parfumerie in Grasse.

► The **GAM – Civic Gallery of Modern and Contemporary Art** inaugurated its season with the “1960-1962 Japan in Turin” exhibition focusing on two of the many initiatives that, between 1958 and 1962, made Torino one of the key locations in Europe concerning the practice of Japanese contemporary artists: the Ikebana installed in 1960 by Sofu Teshigahara and the Structures and Style exhibit conceived by Michel Tapié.



NINJA AND SAMURAI. Magic and aesthetics

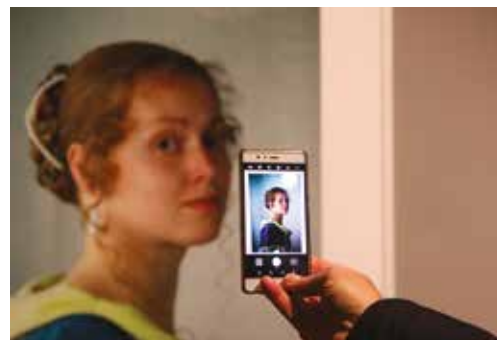
► Curated by Chus Martínez, the “Metamorphoses - Let Everything Happen to You” exhibition held at the **Castle of Rivoli – Museum of Contemporary Art** explored the concept of transformation and flourishing through installations, sculptures, performances, paintings and videos made by emerging international artists.

► The **MAO – Museum of Oriental Art** showcased the history of the famous Japanese samurai and ninjas through the “NINJA AND SAMURAI. Magic and aesthetics” exhibition, featuring about 200 works including weapons, instruments, armours and documents ranging from the sixteenth to the twentieth century.

► The new **Egyptian Museum**, inaugurated in 2015 with an overall exhibition area of 12,000 square metres and over 3,300 pieces on show, continued its activity of scientific dissemination organising several lectures and workshops with international experts.

► **Palazzo Chiabrese** hosted the extraordinary exhibition entitled “Frank Horvat. Story of a photographer” produced by the Royal Museums and curated by Horvat himself. The artist displayed part of his private collection covering more than seventy years of career.

► The **Mastio della Cittadella** presented “INTERIORS”, an exhibition with installations, paintings, sculptures and photographs by 17 contemporary artists from Italy, France, Spain and Germany.

► To celebrate its tenth anniversary, the **PAV – Park of Living Art** displayed “The God-Trick”, a collective exhibition inaugurated on the occasion of the international conference entitled “Anthropocene. Ecological crisis and the transformative potential of art”. The exhibit presented the works of the artists Lara Almarcegui, Michel Blazy, Critical Art Ensemble, Piero Gilardi, Bonnie Ora Sherk and Nomedas and Gediminas Urbonas.

► The **Fondazione Sandretto Re Rebaudengo** hosted “Today, tomorrow and the day after tomorrow”, a project dedicated to Middle-Eastern refugees living on the Greek islands near the border with Turkey. Made up of four different works realised on the island of Samos, the installation displayed images taken from the life inside and outside one of the hotspots where Middle-Eastern refugees from Syria, Afghanistan, Iraq and other countries have been living for years waiting to be transferred to permanent refugees shelters.

► The **Fondazione Merz** presented “Shkrepëtima”, the solo exhibition by the Albanian artist Petrit Halilaj. The three-part project was developed in three different locations: a first performance at the Cultural Center of Runik, Kosovo - the artist's birthplace, a second exhibition at the Zentrum Paul Klee in Bern and the final exhibit in Torino.

► The **Pinacoteca Agnelli** displayed “Frank Lloyd Wright between USA and Italy”, curated by Jennifer Gray. Through photographs, objects,

catalogues, lithographs and original designs, the exhibition explored Wright's ideas about organic architecture from his first journey to Italy in 1910 to his last visit in 1951, focusing on his involvement in the Italian architectural, urban planning and landscape debate.

► The **National Cinema Museum** developed a new project entitled “Soundframes. Cinema and Music on exhibit”. More than 130 film sequences were projected on the Temple Hall's helicoidal ramp, divided into 9 areas, creating an ideal movie telling the countless ways in which music and images have come together in over one century.

► “Human Bodies - The Exhibition”, a world-renowned scientific exposition, has been shown at the **Promotrice delle Belle Arti**. The project, divided into 8 thematic areas, was created to make the human body known to the general public in an educational way through the exposure of real specimens including 150 organs and 12 human bodies.

► 195 galleries coming from 35 countries were exhibited at **Artissima**, the international fair of contemporary art which, in its 25th edition, had time as its main theme. New entry of this edition was the Sound section, hosted at the OGR cultural hub and devoted to monographic sound projects.

► In the week dedicated to contemporary art, Torino hosted **Flashback**, contemporary fair of ancient and modern art, in its sixth

edition; **Dama**, independent project created by international emerging art galleries and **Flat**, international event dedicated to art publications.

► “Feeling different” was the theme chosen for the 14th edition of **Paratissima**, international showcase of independent artists. 357 selected artists exhibited their works in the La Marmora military barracks which also hosted 6 different sections, seminars and workshops dedicated to children and families.

► **The Others**, meeting point between market and cultural innovation, brought together more than 40 galleries and cultural associations from all over the world. The eighth edition was characterized by the new section entitled “Expanded Screen” dedicated to video installation.

► **Luci d’Artista** celebrated its 21st edition engaging the whole city, from the centre to the suburbs, in a perfect union of art and light. The 23 works were inaugurated with the lighting of “My Noon”, the big luminous clock marking the hours in a binary format, in the presence of its author Tobias Rehberger.

► The 12th edition of **MITO SettembreMusica** recorded more than 73,000 spectators in Milan and Torino over 17 days, staging 125 concerts out of which 55 sold out. The theme of dance fascinated the young and heterogeneous audience, confirming the ever-increasing success of the event.

► The season of **Teatro Regio** was characterized by 14 titles, out of which 11 operas and 3 ballet performances including the new edition of “Roberto Bolle and Friends”. The season was further enriched by important international events that led the Orchestra and Choir of the Teatro Regio on tour to Montreux and Saint Petersburg.

► The **Torinodanza Festival** confirmed its international vocation with a wide range of offerings: 18 shows, 34 performances, 10 national premieres, 6 co-productions and 16 companies coming from Burkina Faso, Canada, Belgium, France, Greece, Israel, Italy and Sweden.

► The **Teatro Stabile** season staged 67 performances including 17 productions, 32 guest shows and 18 performances for the Torinodanza programme. Moreover, the Teatro Stabile was the only Italian theatre included in Mitos21, the network having among its members the most important European theatre institutions. The Teatro Stabile will develop with them co-productions in the next three years.

► Over 22,000 people attended the events scheduled for the sixth edition of the **Torino Jazz Festival**, which ended at the OGR cultural hub with the concert by Magic Malik, Riccardo Ruggieri ft. Gary Bartz and Fred Hersch. Great success also for the music events held in care centres and welcome facilities, stressing the social impact of the event.

► “Fluctus, the different aspects of a journey” was the exciting theme of the 23rd edition of the **Festival delle Colline Torinesi – Torino Creazione Contemporanea**. More than 5,000 people enjoyed the 23 shows, meetings and special projects on the bill.

► **Torino Estate Reale** offered, in the evocative setting of Piazzetta Reale, a varied programme ranging from dance to theatre, from music to magic. The festival, in its second edition, was inaugurated by the concert of the St. Petersburg Klassika Orchestra conducted by Maestro Kantorov and hosted 15 international shows overall.

► **Languages on stage!**, the European Student Festival of Plurilingual Theatre aiming to educate young people to European citizenship, knowledge and respect for different cultures through arts gathered in Torino students coming from Italy, Ireland, France, Germany, Greece and Poland.

► The **Fondazione Teatro Ragazzi e Giovani** launched the new season entitled “World on stage”, a long journey through stories, feelings, images, music and ironic moments with the participation of companies from Russia, Italy and France.

► **Incanti**, the international figure festival, dedicated its 25th edition to the theme of travel. The programme featured young companies coming from France, Belgium, the UK, the Netherlands, Germany and Italy.

► The 31st edition of the **International Book Fair** was marked by five questions linked to the main theme: “One Day, all this”, a deep reflection on the world we live in and on the future world awaiting us. France was the guest country of the fair.

► The fourteenth edition of **Torino Spiritualità** interwove lectures, dialogues, meetings and readings around the theme of gentle but irreducible objection, pronounced against the opacity of our times. The festival, entitled “I would prefer not to”, recorded an audience of over 18,000 people, with 100 events held in 30 different venues in the city.

► The 36th edition of the **Torino Film Festival** confirmed its international vocation hosting films and directors from all over the world. The American drama film “Wildlife” won the Best Movie award. **TorinoFilmLab**, the year-round international laboratory that supports emerging talents from all over the world, celebrated its tenth edition.

► The OGR cultural hub hosted for the first time the nineteenth edition of **View Conference**, the international event dedicated to animation industry, special visual effects, virtual reality, digital design and video games. Point of reference for creative industries, media and digital technologies, the event attracted over 50 international guests, including 6 Academy Awards winners, who took part in more than 100 hours of workshops, conferences, lectures, exhibitions, projections and presentations.

► **Film Commission Torino Piemonte**, in its eighteenth anniversary, supported 117 productions from cinema movies and TV series to documentaries and commercials. Moreover it was involved in the organisation of the 22nd edition of “Cartoons on the Bay”, the international cross-media and children’s television festival that hosted nearly 500 productions from all over the world.

► Over 30,000 people coming from all over Italy and Europe attended the fourth edition of **Today’s**, the festival featuring 40 hours of consecutive music in 3 days with over 80 artists and bands performing in regenerated urban spaces.

► The 18th edition of **Club to Club**, the international festival of avant-garde music and new pop, hosted 50 international artists performing non-stop music for over 50 hours with an audience of 60,000 people.

► The **Kappa FuturFestival**, summer event of electronic music and digital arts, confirmed once again its popularity at national and international level. In its seventh edition it attracted a public of over 50,000 people coming from 89 nations including Honduras, Qatar and Saudi Arabia.

► A female line-up with renowned DJs like Nina Kraviz, Ellen Allien and Charlotte de Witte who performed in front of an audience of over 20,000 people coming from 37 different countries characterised the thirteenth edition of **Movement Torino Music Festival**.





SPORT

The City of Torino has long been committed to organizing sporting events at national and international level, in collaboration with federations, sport promotion bodies and associations. Torino has over 200 sport facilities including swimming pools, polyfunctional centres and gyms daily available to the thousands of people who practice sport, confirming the principles of friendship, solidarity and fair play that the Torino 2006 Winter Olympic Games spread among citizens, athletes, volunteers and spectators.

As a confirmation of the leading role it plays on the international sporting scene, in 2018 Torino played host to the Volley Men's World Championship final rounds. The whole community supported the teams during the matches, sharing with them the values of teamwork, training and respect for the opponent. Moreover, Torino has also been chosen to host the 2019 edition of the European Masters Games, taking place from 26 July to 4 August 2019.

22 – 27 January Para Ice Hockey International Tournament

Italy, the United States, Japan and Norway gave life to the seventh edition of the tournament, the last test before the PyeongChang Paralympic Games scheduled for March 2018. The US team won gold.

27 January Thai Boxe Mania

Ninth edition of the international event combining sport and entertainment: athletes from all over the world stepped into the ring in the thai boxing, kick boxing, muay thai and mixed martial arts disciplines.

10 – 11 February International Regatta D'Inverno sul Po

Almost 2,900 athletes and 900 crews crossed the waters of the river Po by participating in the 35th edition of the gran fondo regatta.

6 March Harlem Globetrotters

The worldwide known high-flying acrobatic team animated the PalaRuffini arena with a show featuring individual and group dances, somersaults, dunks and impossible long-distance shots.

18 March Santander La Mezza di Torino

About 4,000 runners took part in the fourth edition of the race which included, in addition to the traditional 21 km run, also the 10 km, the kids run and for the first time the sprint duathlon.

15 April Tutta Dritta foot race

The 16th edition of the running competition was attended by many international champions, who competed in the 10 km race running across the city.

21 – 22 April Torino 24-hour run

Tenth edition of the international ultra marathon competition involving more than 200 athletes from different European countries including Italy, Denmark, Ireland, Spain, France, Germany, Switzerland, Russia and Ukraine.

4 – 6 May International Turin Curling Cup

36 teams from France, Switzerland and Italy competed at the PalaTazzoli arena in the sixth edition of the Winter Olympics sport originated in Scotland.

21 – 31 May Interplay

The festival, dedicated to the new generations of contemporary dance, brought to Torino 100 artists from 10 European and extra-European countries, 8 national premiers as well as debuts and site-specific creations.

9 June – 29 July Africa Cup

Football challenge involving 12 African selections made up of residents, migrants and political refugees plus an Italian team to underline once again the role of football as a tool of social integration.

16 June – 29 July Balon Mondial

49 male teams and 6 female selections competed in the 12th edition of the football world cup of migrant communities living in Torino. The male tournament was won by Colombia, the female one by Peru.

6 – 8 July Turin Acro Cup

300 athletes representing 26 teams and coming from 8 countries met in Torino for the sixth edition of the international event of acrobatic gymnastics.

7 – 14 July XI MA-BO Trophy

The eleventh edition of the international women's tennis tournament was won by the Romanian athlete Andreea Amalia Rosca who defeated the Slovenian Kaja Juvan in the final match.

9 September International Long-Distance Cycling Race

Torino was home, for the fourth consecutive year, to the cycling race hosting more than 1,400 athletes.

22 – 23 September Karate Open Turin Cup International

Eighth edition of the international youth kata and kumite tournament with athletes coming from over ten nations in Europe, Africa and Asia.

26 – 30 September Volleyball World Championship Finals

Torino became the world capital of volley hosting the Men's World Championship final

rounds, for the first time jointly organized by Italy and Bulgaria. An audience of over 12,000 spectators attended the final match at the PalaAlpitour arena, which celebrated Poland's victory over Brazil.

13 – 14 October Rowing for Tokyo

The thirteenth edition of the international para-rowing regatta saw the participation of athletes from 15 different clubs, including the "Viana Remadores do Lima" Portuguese team.

4 November Turin Marathon

1,500 runners competed in the 32nd edition of the Turin Marathon won by the Ethiopian athlete Denbeli Chefo Shuke.

17 November Marinera World Championship

The PalaRuffini arena hosted the European selective round of the traditional popular South-American dance recording 250 couples of dancers. The winners will access the World Championship final taking place in Trujillo, Peru.

IREN Group, one of the main multiutilities in the Italian panorama, operates in the fields of electricity (production, distribution and sale), thermal energy for district heating (production and sale), gas (distribution and sale), management of integrated water services, environmental services (waste collection and disposal) and services for local governments. The Group is also very active in terms of calls for innovation promoted at European level, which are being developed through a network of national and international partners. In 2018 IREN took part in 9 research and innovation projects for a total amount of around 3 million euros, under the EU Horizon 2020, Life+ and VII Framework Programme. The projects, actively involving about 40 employees, promote cooperation activities with business and

academic centres in more than 90 European cities.

In particular, the Group is involved in the following projects: STORE&GO, Pump Heat, Planet and Chester as regards energy carrier networks integration, WaterSpy for the water sector and BioMethER for environmental issues. In 2018 the FABRIC project on electric mobility and on-road charging of vehicles ended while the NeMo project is still going on. Moreover, the Group is also testing alternative energy sources with the EVERYWHERE project.

SMAT

SMAT Group manages the integrated water service of the City of Torino and other 291 municipalities of the Metropolitan City. The company is national leader in the areas of engineering, construction and management of diversified water sources, drinking water treatment plants, sanitation systems and recycling of urban waste water.

In 2018 SMAT, through its Research Centre, carried on projects belonging to the Horizon 2020 programme working with local academic centres and European industrial stakeholders, thus strengthening its international activity both at European and non-European level.

In 2018 it started the activities foreseen by the project entitled "AQUALity Interdisciplinary cross-sectoral approach to effectively address the removal of contaminants of emerging concern from water", aiming at training 15 highly-skilled scientists to face present and

future challenges concerning the protection of water resources from contaminants of emerging concern.

It also submitted two project proposals: BRIGADIER, a project aiming at supporting specialized staff to identify vulnerabilities and creating a Water Security Toolkit (WST) to collect the information required to support the decision-making processes in terms of system security, decrease users' exposure to contaminants and maximize the response strategies effectiveness. The second project proposal, INTERWATER, aims to promote the exchange of information in the framework of circular economy and efficient use of water resources and to develop tools supporting decision-making processes. SMAT will have the task to foster access to information, integrate the tools tested within the project and disseminate the results.

SMAT carried on the activities connected to the DEMOSOFC project, providing for the installation of the first industrial-scale SOFC (Solid Oxide Fuel Cell) plant for the production of electricity from biogas generated by the treatment of waste water in order to obtain clean energy, in particular installing the second biokomp cell.

Another project funded by the Horizon 2020

programme is BIOWYSE – Biocontamination Integrated cOntrol Wet sYstem for Space Exploration, foreseeing the development of kits for the instantaneous detection of water biocontamination level. The prototype, designed for use on the International Space Station, will allow astronauts to monitor in real time the microbiological quality of water intended for consumption, which is currently manually sampled to be sent to Earth and analysed after several months.

SMAT also submitted, as a partner, the BIOENPRO4TO Bioenergy & Products for Torino – Smart Solutions for Smart Communities project, financed by POR-FESR funds. The project aims to boost bioenergy and bioproducts starting from the integrated conversion process of organic municipal solid wastes, primary and/or residual biomass and residues created by local communities' daily life. SMAT will take charge of water supply requirements.

It also carried on Biogas4Energy (Biogas Purification and conditioning from the anaerobic digestion of sludges coming from waste water), the project aiming at developing a study complementing the DEMOSOFC project on biogas purification for applications in fuel cells and for the production of transport biomethane.

SMAT finalised the activities planned in the framework of the PERSEO Personal Radiation Shielding for IntErplanetary MissiOns project, having as main objective the assessment of effectiveness of a wearable personal radiation protection system, to be used in a pressurized environment, to provide adequate shielding against Solar Particle Events (SPE) and to mitigate the effects of Galactic Cosmic Rays (GCR) on astronauts.

SMAT also welcomed foreign delegations coming from Belarus, Lebanon and Argentina which visited its premises and Research Centre.

GTT

GTT - Gruppo Torinese Trasporti - is a stock corporation wholly owned by the City of Torino through its subsidiary, FCT Holding S.r.l., with a total staff of about 4,600 employees.

GTT manages an underground automated line, nearly 90 urban and suburban bus lines, 8 tram lines, 70 out-of-town bus lines and 2 railway lines, besides some parking areas and some tourist services such as the Sassi-Superga tramway and the panoramic elevator inside the Mole Antonelliana. Its transport services run from Torino to the provinces of Asti, Alessandria and Cuneo.

GTT was one of the first transport companies to get the "Recognised for excellence" award by the not-for-profit organisation EFQM - European Foundation for Quality Management. Moreover, it received the 2012 Certiquality Award for environmental innovation and it was certified to the OHSAS 18001 standard concerning occupational health and safety.

In 2018 GTT continued its collaboration with Uijeongbu LRT, the Korean transport company managing the underground line operating in the suburbs of Seoul, on the maintenance of rolling stocks and staff training. GTT also cooperates with Tisséo Réseau Urbain, the company managing the underground line in Toulouse and has a commercial agreement and promotional exchange with SNCF (French railways).

5T

5T is the in-house providing company of the City of Torino, GTT - Gruppo Torinese Trasporti, Piedmont Region and Metropolitan City of Torino. It focuses on ITS solutions for integrated management of private and public mobility, offering expertise and services in the areas of traffic, infomobility, public transport and ticketing.

In 2018 5T enhanced its international relations hosting a high number of foreign delegations and taking part in several European projects.

In February 5T went on a mission to the Consorcio ABC metropolitan area in Brazil together with the City of Torino, the Politecnico

of Torino and Torino Wireless for the exchange of best practices in the field of metropolitan mobility management. The visit was organized in the framework of the City-to-City European project, funded by the International Urban Cooperation (IUC) programme. In May 5T welcomed a delegation from the Consorcio ABC who visited the 5T Mobility and Infomobility Center in Torino. In March 5T trained 21 foreign students on urban mobility in the framework of STREET, the European project promoted by ENGIM Piemonte. It also supported the IMOVE Ideathon which took place in October. IMOVE is a European project having as a partner the City of Torino. Finally, 5T became one of the main utilities of Torino City Lab, a project of the City of Torino aimed at promoting and attracting innovation and R&D skills in the area.

SAGAT Airport

Torino Airport is one of the most important infrastructures in Piedmont, promoting economic activities and job creation in the region. Equipped with cutting-edge infrastructures, the airport offers more than 350 weekly scheduled flights, ensuring punctuality, security and comfort.

Daily connections with the main European and Mediterranean airports include Amsterdam, Barcelona, Brussels, Casablanca, Frankfurt, London Gatwick, Madrid, Monaco, Paris and Rome. Currently scheduled airlines serving the airport are Air Dolomiti, Air France, Air Italy, Air Moldova, Alitalia, Blue Air, Blu-Express, British Airways, Brussels Airlines, easyJet, KLM, Jet2.com, Iberia, Lot, Lufthansa, Royal Air Maroc, Ryanair, S7 Airlines, TUI fly, Volotea, Vueling and Wizz Air.

In 2018 Torino Airport inaugurated new direct international flights to Athens with Aegean Airlines, Berlin with easyJet, Fez with Ryanair, Naples with Volotea and easyJet, Krakow, Paris, Stockholm, Stuttgart with Blue Air, Cagliari and Rome with Blue Panorama.

Scheduled flights from Warsaw and Katowice by LOT as well as from London Stansted and Leeds by Jet2.com were opened for

the incoming winter season. Moreover, new charter flights from Scandinavia increased the offer for the ski season.

In January-December 2018 Torino Airport reported a traffic of 4,084,293 passengers.

It continued to develop the non-aviation segment through a great commercial and entertainment offering. In 2018, the airport confirmed its partnership with the National Cinema Museum, with Artissima, with Thales Alenia Space and with CUS Torino - University Sports Center. It also consolidated its cooperation with the Teatro Regio of Torino, organizing the final concert of the Airport music season, also hosting during the Movement festival a live electronic jazz music performance.

SAGAT received the second award at the ACI EUROPE Best Airport Awards competition, highly commended in the "under 5 million passengers" category due to its commitment towards the whole community.

In 2018, its vision focused on innovation and digitalisation. The Airport started a process of digital transformation to meet customers' needs in an efficient and

agile way implementing a range of new solutions: enhanced wi-fi, a web app to get information, e-gates for boarding pass reading, digital lockers for luggage, a digital safety management system to monitor queues at security checkpoints, a digital platform used by the different actors working within the airport to share real time data, a new e-commerce platform, a native app, digital lockers for shopping bags.

The Airport also opened the Innovation Lab, a research centre aiming to facilitate the networking of companies, research areas, start-ups and universities by bringing them together and helping them share data to test digital solutions improving the passengers' experience.

SAGAT contributed to the promotion of the area as a tourist destination, in agreement with the carriers and in collaboration with Turismo Torino e Provincia and DMO Piemonte. This collaboration, in partnership with Blue Air, allowed to welcome a group of influencers from Stuttgart and promote the incoming flights from Lisbon, Stockholm and Paris.
